# RULES and REGULATIONS

1. That competition for the following prizes be open to the world, except when otherwise specified in the Prize List.

*(All fees include G.S.T. where applicable)*

## 2. ADMISSION FEES:

**Thursday, Sept. 27th - \$2.00** with food donation (to Caledonia & District Multi-Service Centre Food Bank) **\$3.00** without, Elementary School and under **FREE**. Fair opens at **4:00 p.m.**

**Friday, Sept. 28th - Adults \$6.00, High School Students \$3.00** until 5 p.m., Elementary School and under free. Haldimand County Elementary School Pass Valid Sept. 28th Only.

**Saturday, September 29th - Adults \$6.00, Elementary School \$1.00.**

**Sunday, September 30th - Adults \$6.00, Elementary School \$1.00.**

## CHILDREN 5 & UNDER FREE

Limited car parking on the grounds - \$2.00.

3. All exhibitors to receive an Exhibitors ticket instead of a membership card.
4. That annual Senior exhibitor fee will be \$6.00 and Junior exhibitor fee \$3.00. Each exhibitor must purchase an exhibitor ticket before making entries, a registered firm being recognized as one exhibitor. Membership may also be purchased for \$6.00. Membership does not entitle the holder to admission to the fair.
5. All entries to be made by mail or otherwise by September 14th to the Secretary, 151 Caithness St. E. Caledonia N3W 1C2.
6. Where the amount of prizes won by the exhibitor is over \$12.00, \$6.00 will be retained for exhibitor fee for 2002. Entry Fees, as specified, will be charged. GST will be applied to Entry Fees where applicable.
7. Where the amount of prizes won by the exhibitor is less than \$3.00 there will be no deductions in lieu of entry fees.
8. The Society will not be responsible for any loss, damage or accident occurring to any person or property on the grounds during the Fair. The Directors hope patrons of the Fair obey orders. The Society will take all reasonable care of exhibits, but will not be responsible for any loss or damage. **(Please note Hold Harmless Agreement on following page.)**
9. While every possible assistance will be most cheerfully given in placing exhibits, no package or case of any kind whatsoever will be opened unless accompanied by the exhibitor or someone sent specially in charge.
10. That all articles entered for competition must be entered in strict accordance with the Prize List in order to secure a prize, the exact number and quantity stated in the prize list being strictly adhered to.
11. No member will be allowed to make more than one entry in each case for Society Prizes with the same animal or article unless otherwise specified. This rule not to apply to animals in herds or pens, nor to special prizes offered by persons outside the Society, but to apply to all kinds of grains, seeds, flowers, roots and vegetables, domestic and horticultural products, in which additional specimens would necessarily be similar to the first.
12. All produce to be growth of parties exhibiting same. Every animal, fowl, article, product or chattel exhibited must be the actual bona fide property and belong absolutely to the person or persons entering or exhibiting the same. In the case of every article, product or chattel exhibited, other than

livestock, the said article, product or chattel must be of the actual production, growth or manufacture, as the case may be, of the person or persons owning or exhibiting the same, except specially mentioned in the list.

13. Tickets will be placed on the work that has been exhibited before, or is entered in the wrong list, with the words "Ruled Out".
14. That the exhibitor of horses, cattle or sheep do bring them forward when called upon by the Directors, otherwise they will not be noticed.
15. No competitor will be entitled to a prize if the judges deem the stock or article unworthy of the same.
16. Any person interfering by conversation or otherwise, with the judges until after judgement is passed, shall have no prize awarded him.
17. Any exhibitor making a protest to the official judges will be required to make a deposit of \$50.00, and if said protest is not sustained the said amount will be retained by the Association.
18. All protests to be made in writing as soon as possible, so that the judges in the class may be heard on it, as the Directors of the Society do not constitute a Board of Judges to hear complaints. The Directors earnestly hope that all exhibitors will not enter protests without strong grounds for doing so, as much annoyance and unpleasantness is occasioned by protests of a frivolous nature.
19. In case an error occurs in the printing of the Prize List, the Directors have the power to rectify the same.
20. In case of insufficient funds, due to weather or other conditions, the Society reserves the right to pay only a percentage of the prizes awarded for exhibits.
21. Should a livestock show be cancelled due to weather or other conditions, the Society reserves the right to pay only a percentage of the prize money for that portion and/or mileage consideration, at the final decision of the Society executive.
22. Notice is hereby given that the Officers of the Society may, by their rules and regulations, prohibit and prevent theatrical, circus and mountebank performances, the sale of lottery tickets, exhibitions or shows, and may prohibit the sale of cheap jewellery or other articles of a similar nature, and no games of chance or gambling will be permitted on the grounds or within 200 yards thereof; the Society may also regulate or prevent the huckstering or trafficking in fruit, goods, wares or merchandise on the Exhibition Grounds, or within 300 yards thereof.
23. ALL CHEQUES FOR PRIZE MONEY MUST BE PRESENTED AT THE BANK BY THE LAST BANKING DAY IN NOVEMBER.

## HOLD HARMLESS AGREEMENT

Two and three-year-old colts may be shown in harness as teams. Teams and Single Horses in harness must be shown hitched to a suitable four-wheeled vehicle. Stallions cannot be shown in Harness

DRIVERS MAY BE REQUIRED TO DRIVE A COURSE

**\*Exhibitor Plus One Helper (ONLY) Allowed Through Gate With No Admission Charge**

*Exhibitors must bring their horses promptly when called. Be sure and check the time schedule for judging.*

Entry Fee - 15% deducted from prize winners.

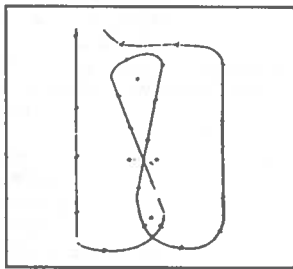

## GENERAL RULES FOR ALL BREEDS DEFINITIONS

- 1.a **EXHIBIT**  
For the purpose of the Classifications an exhibit shall be interpreted as follows: All registered animals, whether owned by one person or by more than one person (individually or jointly), are considered to be the production of the farm breeding unit on which they are maintained.
- b **EXHIBITOR**  
An exhibitor is any breeder or firm which presents animals for official placing by a judge at the time specified by the fair for judging.
- c **BREEDING UNIT**  
For the purposes of the Classifications a "Breeding Units" is defined as follows: In each classification where common interests are involved in more than one breeding operation such operations are considered as one Breeding Unit. In all cases where there is any doubt that more than one breeding unit exists, the interpretation shall be that only one breeding unit exists. The responsibility of proof of separation of breeding units shall rest with the exhibitor(s).
- d **PUREBRED**  
"Purebred" means an animal that is purebred of the breed as determined by the by-laws of an association authorized to register animals of that breed.
2. **CHECKING OF EXHIBITS**  
Checking of exhibits is the responsibility of the fair. The fair will exclude ineligible animals and those not positively identified before judging. Proof of Ownership must be available upon request.  
**NOTE:** Cattle must be in barns by 10:00 a.m. on the day that class is shown and must remain in the grounds until after 4:00 p.m. This rule will be strictly enforced.

The "Code of Ethics for Dairy Cattle Exhibitors" must be strictly obeyed.

### NO EXITS OR ENTRANCES TO BE BLOCKED Exhibitors Must Supply Their Own Straw

Animals are to be brought into the ring youngest to eldest (according to age).

All animals to be on grounds by 10 o'clock Friday, September 28th, 2001

Judging will commence promptly at 11:00 a.m.

Cattle must be removed from the grounds before 5:00 p.m.

**The Haldimand-Norfolk Holstein Club is charging an entry fee of \$2.00 per animal to a maximum of \$20.00 per Exhibitor. This does not apply to 4-H Project calves. Please send a cheque payable to the Haldimand-Norfolk Holstein Club with your entry.**

Entries must be in the hands of the Fair Secretary, on special forms supplied, by Friday, August 31st, 2001. Please make sure your mailing address is complete.

**NOTE: Cattle not entered by August 31st cannot be exhibited.**

2. **FLEECE**  
The following breeds must be shown in short fleece (staple less than 1 inch or 2.50 cm): Border Cheviot, Dorset, Hampshire, Oxford Down, Shropshire, Southdown, Suffolk at shows that fall between April 1 and October 14 inclusive. The same breeds mentioned above are allowed to be shown at shows that fall between October 15 and March 31, in staple length not more than 1.5 inches or 3.8 cm.

Other breeds may be shown in short or full fleece at the discretion of the fair.

### RULES and REGULATIONS

Exhibitor Plus One Helper (ONLY) Allowed Through Gate With No Admission Charge

1. Competition will be restricted to:  
Breeders residing within District 4 comprised of the Regions of Hamilton- Wentworth, Haldimand-Norfolk, Niagara and Brant County. THIS RULE WILL BE STRICTLY ENFORCED.
2. Sheep must be on the grounds not later than 9:00 a.m. Judging to commence at 10 a.m. No animal will be permitted to leave the grounds previous to 4:00 p.m.
3. All animals must be registered in the name of the exhibitor, except for Commercial Classes. Exhibitors must present registration certificates at the time of showing. Any animal will be barred if the exhibitor fails to provide proof of ownership.
4. Exhibitors will not be permitted to make more than 2 entries in 2 classes for single animals and more than 1 entry in flock and market lamb classes.
5. Substitute animals may be entered before 9:30 a.m. in place of entries already made.
6. Each exhibitor shall pay a 2000 Exhibitor Fee (\$6.00) to the Caledonia Agricultural Society. Entry fee will be 15% (+G.S.T.) deducted from prize money won.

7. Each exhibitor must be a member of the District 4 Ontario Sheep Marketing Agency. Membership may be obtained at time of entry. 4-H members owning their own lambs will be exempt from \$10.00 membership to District 4.
8. All classes must be judged in the ring to be eligible for prize money regardless of the number of entries.
