

 That competition for the following prizes be open to the world, except when otherwise specified in the Prize List.

(All fees include G.S.T.)

 ADMISSION FEES: Thursday, October 1st - \$1.00 with food donation (to Caledonia & District Multi-Service Centre Food Bank) \$2.00 without, 14 and under FREE.

Friday, October 2nd - Adults \$5.00, High School Students \$2.00, Public School and under free until 5 p.m.

Saturday, October 3 - Adults \$5.00, Children between the age of 6 and 14 years \$1.00.
Sunday, October 4th - Adults \$5.00, Children between the age of 6

Sunday, October 4th - Adults \$5.00, Children between the age of 6 and 14 \$1.00.

Grandstand will be free both afternoons and evenings.

Limited car parking on the grounds and on the square - \$2.50.

- 3. All exhibitors to receive an exhibitors ticket instead of a membership card. Exhibitor Ticket must be retained for entry pick-up.
- 4. That annual Senior exhibitor fee will be \$5.00 (GST incl.) and Junior exhibitor fee \$3.00 (GST incl.). Each exhibitor must purchase an exhibitor ticket before making entries, a registered firm being recognized as one exhibitor. Membership may also be purchased for \$5.00 (GST incl.). Membership does not entitle the holder to admission to the fair.
- All entries to be made by mail or otherwise by September 18th to the Secretary at Caledonia. (Box 1000, Caledonia NOA 1A0).
- Completed entry tags and exhibitor ticket will be mailed to all Exhibitors whose entry lists are in our office before September 18th.
- 7. Where the amount of prizes won by the exhibitor is over \$10.00, \$5.00 (GST incl.) will be retained for exhibitor fee for 1993.

7a.GST will be applied to Entry Fees.

- 8. Where the amount of prizes won by the exhibitor is less than \$3.00 there will be no deductions in lieu of entry fees.
- 9. The Society will not be responsible for any loss, damage or accident occurring to any person or property on the grounds during the Fair. The Directors hope patrons of the Fair will obey orders. The Society will take all reasonable care of exhibits, but will not be responsible for any loss or damage.
- 10. While every possible assistance will be most cheerfully given in placing exhibits, no package or case of any kind whatsoever will be opened unless accompanied by the exhibitor or someone sent specially in charge.
- 11. That all articles entered for competition must be entered in strict accordance with the Prize List in order to secure a prize, the exact number and quantity stated in the Prize List being strictly adhered to.
- 12. No member will be allowed to make more than one entry in each case for Society Prizes with the same animal or article unless otherwise specified. This rule not to apply to animals in herds or pens, nor to special prizes offered by persons outside the Society, but to apply to all kinds of grains, seeds, flowers, roots and vegetables, domestic and horticultural products, in which additional specimens would necessarily be similar to the first.

- 13. All produce to be growth of parties exhibiting same. Every animal, fowl, article, product or chattel exhibited must be the actual bona fide property and belong absolutely to the person or persons entering or exhibiting the same. In the case of every article, product or chattel exhibited, other than livestock, the said article, product or chattel must be of the actual production, growth or manufacture, as the case may be, of the person or persons owning or exhibiting the same, except specially mentioned in the list.
- 14. Tickets will be placed on the work that has been exhibited before, or is entered in the wrong list, with the words "Ruled Out".
- 15. That the exhibitor of horses, cattle and sheep do bring them forward when called upon by the Directors, otherwise they will not be noticed.
- 16. No competitor will be entitled to a premium if the judges deem the stock or article unworthy of the same.
- 17. Any person interfering by conversation or otherwise, with the judges until after judgement is passed, shall have no prize awarded him.
- 18. Any exhibitor making a protest to the official judges will be required to make a deposit of \$50.00, and if said protest is not sustained the said amount will be retained by the Association.
- 19. All protests to be made in writing as soon as possible, so that the judges in the class may be heard on it, as the Directors of the Society do not constitute a Board of Judges to hear complaints. The Directors earnestly hope that the exhibitors will not enter protests without strong grounds for doing so, as much annoyance and unpleasantness is occasioned by protests of a frivolous nature.
- 20. In case an error occurs in the printing of the Prize List, the Directors have the power to rectify the same.
- 21. In case of insufficient funds, due to weather or other conditions, the Society reserves the right to pay only a percentage of the prizes awarded for exhibits.
- 21a. Should a livestock show be cancelled due to weather or other conditions, the Society reserves the right to pay only a percentage of the prize money for that portion and/or a mileage consideration, at the final decision of the Society executive.
- 22. DEFINITIONS

1 a) EXHIRIT

For the purposes of the Classifications an exhibit shall be interpreted as follows: All registered animals, whether owned by one person or by more than one person (individually or jointly), are considered to be the production of the farm or breeding unit on which they are maintained.

b) EXHIBITOR

An exhibitor is any breeder or firm which presents animals or farm produce for official placing by a judge at the time specified by the fair for judging.

c) BREEDING UNIT

For the purposes of the Classifications a "Breeding Unit" is defined as follows:

In each classification where the same or common interests are involved in more than one breeding operation such operations are considered as **one** Breeding Unit. In all cases where there is any doubt that more than one breeding unit exists, the interpretation shall be that only one breeding unit exists. The responsibility of proof of separation of breeding units shall rest with the exhibitor(s).

d) PUREBRED

"Purebred" means an animal that is purebred of the breed as determined by the by-laws of an association authorized to register animals of that breed.

 To be eligible for Federal Contributions, each breed must be shown separately and have at least three (3) exhibitors and twenty-four (24) exhibits.

3. CHECKING OF EXHIBITS

Checking of exhibits is the responsibility of the fair or exhibition adopting the Classifications. The fair must exclude ineligible animals and those not positively identified before judging.



This sketch of "Caledonia Mills" was copied from the 1879 Historical Atlas of Haldimand County. Approximately 100 years ago Caledonia Mills was one of two first-class flouring mills in the Village of Caledonia, with one on each bank of the Grand River. These Mills were owned and operated by the partnership of McQuarry, Thorburn and Munro who were the largest dealers in grain in Haldimand County. These two Mills, which gave employment to forty men, turned out 1500 barrels of flour weekly and most of this flour was shipped to Montreal for consumption in the Lower Provinces of Canada.
