# **RULES & REGULATIONS**

- That competition for the following prizes be open to the world, except when otherwise specified in the prize list.
- The annual exhibitor fee will be \$10.00, or junior exhibitor fee of \$5.00 for youth age seventeen
  and younger except when otherwise specified. Each exhibitor must pay their exhibitor fee
  before bringing entries to the fairgrounds. Exhibitor fees are inclusive of HST (HST No.
  106829849 RT0001).
- 3. A registered firm will be recognized as one exhibitor.
- 4. Each exhibitor will be supplied with one admission ticket.
- 5. All entries are to be made with the general manager online, by mail, or otherwise by 5:00pm on September 24, 2025 except when otherwise specified.
- 6. Where the amount of prizes won by the exhibitor is over \$15.00, \$10.00 (inclusive of HST) will be retained as an exhibitor fee for 2026. Youth age seventeen and younger will have no exhibitor fees retained.
- 7. Entry fees, as specified in the prize list, plus HST will also be retained.
- 8. Where the prizes won by the exhibitor are less than \$15.00, there will be no exhibitor or entry fees retained.
- 9. The exhibitor acknowledges and agrees that they shall assume all risks associated with exhibiting and be responsible for any and all of their actions. The exhibitor hereby agrees to indemnify and hold harmless the Caledonia Agricultural Society and their respective agents, officers, directors, members, servants, and employees from and against all claims, actions, proceedings, suits, losses, damages, injuries, or death brought by or sustained by and person or entity, including, but not limited to all costs and expenses incurred in defending such claims by the Caledonia Agricultural Society caused by, resulting from, or in any way related to the exhibitor; the negligent actions or omission of the exhibitor, its members, officers, servants, employees, agents, contractors, invitees, or any other associates, or any breach or default of any of the terms of these rules and regulations. The exhibitor further agrees that the Caledonia Agricultural Society and any of its officers, directors, members, representatives, agents, and employees shall not be liable for any loss, theft, or damage to the goods, wares, merchandise, or property of the exhibitor and the exhibitor's members, officers, servants, employees, agents, contractors, invitees, or any other associates.
- 10. While every possible assistance will be most cheerfully given in placing exhibits, no package or case of any kind whatsoever will be opened unless accompanied by the exhibitor or someone sent specially in charge.
- 11. That all articles entered for competition must be entered in strict accordance with the prize list in order to secure a prize, the exact number and quantity stated in the prize list being strictly adhered to.
- 12. No exhibitor will be allowed to make more than one entry in each case for prizes with the same animal or article except when otherwise specified.
- 13. All produce to be growth of parties exhibiting same. Every animal, fowl, article, product, or chattel exhibited must be the bona fide property and belong absolutely to the person or persons exhibiting the same except when otherwise specified.
- 14. The committee may write 'RULED OUT' on the entry tag for any work that has been exhibited before or is entered in the wrong list.
- 15. That the exhibitor of horses, cattle, or other livestock do bring them forward when called upon by the committee otherwise they will not be noticed.
- 16. No exhibitor will be entitled to a prize if the judges deem the stock or article unworthy of same.
- Any person interfering by conversation or otherwise with the judges shall have no prize awarded them.

- 18. Any exhibitor making a protest to the official judges will be required to make a deposit of \$50.00, and if said protest is not sustained, the amount will be retained by the Caledonia Agricultural Society. All protests are to be made in writing before October 31st, so that the judges in the class may be heard on it.
- 19. In case an error occurs in the prize list, the Society have the power to rectify the same.
- 20. In the case of insufficient funds, due to weather or other reasons, the Society reserves the right to pay only a percentage of the prizes awarded for exhibits.
- 21. Should the exhibition be cancelled due to weather or other reasons, the Society reserves the right to pay only a percentage of the prize money for that portion at the final decision of the Society.
- 22. All cheques for prize money must be deposited before the last banking day of November. Prize cheques will not be re-issued or re-printed if lost or damaged by the exhibitor. Should an exhibitor allege a correction to prize money awarded be required, same will be made in writing before October 31st.

If there is any question of the state of health of an animal brought to the attention of the directors of the Caledonia Agricultural Society, the exhibitor will be required, at their own expense, to provide veterinary inspection to confirm the animal's state of good health. If it cannot be demonstrated, the exhibitor will be required to remove the animal(s) from the fairgrounds immediately.

#### **DEFINITIONS**

*Exhibit*: All registered animals, whether owned by one person or by more than one person are considered to be the production of the farm breeding unit on which they are maintained.

Exhibitor: Any breeder, person, or firm which presents animals for official placing by a judge at the time specified by the Fair for judging.

Breeding Unit: Where common interests are involved in more than one breeding operation, such operations are considered one breeding operation, such operations are considered one breeding unit. Where there is doubt that more than one breeding unit exists, the interpretation shall be that only one breeding unit exists. The responsibility of proof of breeding units shall rest with the exhibitor.

Purebred: An animal determined by the by-laws of an association authorized to register animals of that breed.

#### **CHECKING OF EXHIBITS**

Checking exhibits is the responsibility of the Fair. The Fair must exclude ineligible animals and those not positively identified before judging. Animals will be checked for health and identification before judging. All cattle must be tagged with an approved RFID tag before arrival on the Fairgrounds.

#### ANIMAL REGISTRATION

All exhibits must be registered in the name of the exhibitor in accordance with the by-laws of their respective associations. Registration papers must be available for checking by the committee.

#### PLACEMENT AND REMOVAL OF ANIMALS

Cattle must be in the barns by 10:00am on the day that class is shown and must remain on the grounds for viewing until 4:00pm. This rule will be strictly enforced. Exhibitors must supply their own straw.


