MEMBERSHIPS

Junior Memberships are \$1.00 each and allow Juniors to exhibit in Junior Departments, Classes 43 and 44 only. Should Juniors wish to exhibit in other classes they must obtain a "Senior Membership", only, at \$2.00.

Senior Memberships are \$2.00 each and must be obtained by every Exhibitor showing in the open classes.

Both Junior and Senior Memberships entitle the holder, only, to admission at any time to the 1970 Caledonia Fair.

A Note To Our Exhibitors

Each year it becomes more essential that all entries for the Exhibition Hall be received well in advance of our opening dates so that we may operate a smooth running Fair. Entries in these Departments MUST be received by Monday, September 28th, however, two or three weeks before that date would be greatly appreciated. We do not encourage added entries, nevertheless, we will continue to cheerfully allow up to five added entries on Wednesday evening, September 30th when the exhibits are brought in, to any Exhibitor who has forwarded their main list well in advance of our closing dead-line.

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RULES and REGULATIONS

- That competition for the following prizes be open to the world, except when otherwise specified in the Prize List.
- 2. ADMISSION FEES:

Thursday, October 1st—Adults \$1.00, Children between the age of 6 and 14 years 25c.

Thursday Night, October 1st—Adults \$1.00, Children between the age of 6 and 14 years 50c.

Friday, October 2nd—Adults \$1.00, High School Students 25c, Public School and under free.

Friday Night, October 2nd—Adults \$1.00, Children between the age of 6 and 14 years 50c.

Saturday, October 3rd—Adults \$1.00, Children between the age of 6 and 14 years 25c.

Saturday Night, October 3rd—Adults \$1.00, Children between the age of 6 and 14 years 50c.
Grandstand will be free both afternoons and evenings.

Limited car parking on the grounds 50c.

- 3. That annual Senior membership will be \$2.00 and Junior membership \$1.00. Each exhibitor must purchase a member's ticket before making entries, a registered firm being recognized as one exhibitor.
- All entries to be made by mail or otherwise before 8 p.m. on Monday, September 28th, 1970, to the Secretary at Caledonia
- 5. Completed entry tags and Member's Tickets will be mailed to all Exhibitors whose entry lists are in our office before Saturday, September 26th.
- 6. Where the amount of prizes won by the exhibitor is \$5.00 or over, \$2.00 will be retained for Membership Fee for 1971.

 Where the amount of prize money, won by the Exhibitor, is less than \$2.00 there will be no deductions in lieu of entry fees.
- 7. Poultry must be on the ground and put in order by 9.00 a.m. on the first day of the Fair, October 1st, and to remain until Saturday, October 3rd at 5.00 p.m.
- 8. Cattle must not be removed from the cattle barns before 5.00 p.m. on the day on which they are shown. Any exhibitor who does so shall forfeit his prize money.
- 9. No entries to be removed from the Hall until 9 p.m. on the third day of the Fair.
- 10. The Society will not be responsible for any loss, damage or accident occurring to any person or property on the grounds during the Fair. The Directors hope patrons of the Fair will obey orders. The Society will take all reasonable care of exhibits, but will not be responsible for any loss or damage.
- 11. While every possible assistance will be most cheerfully given in placing exhibits, no package or case of any kind whatsoever will be opened unless accompanied by the exhibitor or someone sent specially in charge.

CALEDONIA FAIR PRIZE LIST-1970

- 12. That all articles entered for competition must be entered in strict accordance with the Prize List in order to secure a prize, the exact number and quantity stated in the Prize List being strictly adhered to.
- 13. No member will be allowed to make more than one entry in each case for Society Prizes with the same animal or article unless otherwise specified. This rule not to apply to animals in herds or pens, nor to special prizes offered by persons outside the Society, but to apply to all kinds of grains, seeds, flowers, roots and vegetables, dairy products, domestic manufacturers and horticultural products, in which additional specimens would necessarily be similar to the first.
- 14. All produce to be growth of parties exhibiting same.

 Every animal, fowl, article, product or chattel exhibited must be the actual bona fide property and belong absolutely to the person or persons entering or exhibiting the same. In the case of every article, product or chattel exhibited, other than live stock, the said article, product or chattel must be of the actual production, growth or manufacture, as the case may be, of the person or persons owning or exhibiting the same, except specially mentioned in the list.
- All articles of manufacture including ladies' work must be modern.
- 16. Tickets will be placed on the work that has been exhibited before, or is entered in the wrong list, with the words "Ruled Out."
- 17. Not less than one bushel of each kind of grain must be shown unless otherwise specified in the Prize List, and the grain and roots must be growth of 1970 and grown by the Competitor except clover seed which may be growth of 1969.
- 18. The exhibitor's name must not be on the bag, etc. in which his produce is exhibited.
- 19. That the exhibitor of horses, cattle, sheep and pigs do bring them forward when called upon by the Directors, otherwise they will not be noticed.
- 20. That no person be allowed to attach any prize or badge obtained at other fairs on any animal or article exhibited until after the judges have made their awards.
- 21. Judging will commence at 9.00 A.M. sharp, October 1st and 12.30 o'clock noon on October 2nd and 3rd unless otherwise specified in the Prize List.
- 22. The members of the different committees will be on the grounds at 9 a.m. each day or earlier.
- 23. No competitor will be entitled to a premium if the judges deem the stock or article unworthy of the same.
- 24. Any person interfering by conversation or otherwise, with the judges until after judgment is passed, shall have no prize awarded him.
- 25. Judges will please sign and hand in their list of awards to the secretary, and they are particularly requested not to leave the grounds until they have ascertained from the Secretary

- that there are no protests against the awards in their department.
- 26 Any exhibitor making a protest will be required to make a deposit of \$3.00, and if said protest is not sustained the said amount will be retained by the Association.
- 27. All protests to be made in writing as soon as possible, so that the judges in the class may be heard on it, as the Directors of the Society do not constitute a Board of Judges to hear complaints. The Directors earnestly hope that the exhibitors will not enter protests without strong grounds for doing so, as much annoyance and unpleasantness is occasioned by protests of a frivolous nature.
- 28. In case an error occurs in the printing of the Prize List, the Directors have the power to rectify the same.
- 29. The sale of lottery tickets will not be allowed on the Caledonia Fair Grounds or within 300 yards of the grounds unless sponsored by the Caledonia Agricultural Society.

GENERAL RULES FOR ALL BREEDS

TUBERCULOSIS: Test for tuberculosis are not required to cover cattle originating from:-

- (a) Herds dealt with under the Accredited Herd Plan in good standing;
- (b) Herds in accredited areas in good standing.

ALL OTHER CATTLE will be required to pass a negative test within sixty days of the opening date of the fair.

BRUCELLOSIS: All cattle six months of age or over (steers and spayed heifers excepted) will be required to pass a negative test conducted by a Veterinarian of the Health of Animals Division within sixty days of the opening date of the fair, except:-

- (a) Animals originating in Brucellosis Free Listed Herds.
- (b) Officially vaccinated animals under 30 months of age.
- (c) Animals originating from Brucellosis certified area herds in good standing.
- (d) Cattle originating in herds in Brucellosis Control areas not yet certified, provided the herd has been negative within three months prior to the opening date of the fair.

One negative test conducted by a Veterinarian of the Health of Animals Division has always been acceptable to qualify BULLS for exhibition purposes during a period of six months following date of test.

Option 1 of the Canada Department of Agriculture Classifications are adopted for all breeds of Cattle except the Black and White Show which has Option 2.

Category 6 of the 1969 prize money schedule is adopted for all breeds.

DEFINITION OF AN "ENTRY"

For the purpose of the 1970 Cattle Classifications an entry shall be interpreted as follows:

All registered cattle, whether owned by one person or by more than one person (individually or jointly) which are maintained on one farm or breeding unit, are considered to be the production of one farm or breeding unit.

Therefore, only one entry per class is eligible from such farm or breeding unit, unless otherwise authorized by the fair.

Cattle must be in the barns by 10.00 a.m. on the day that class is shown and must remain on the grounds until after 5.00 p.m. This rule will be strictly enforced.
