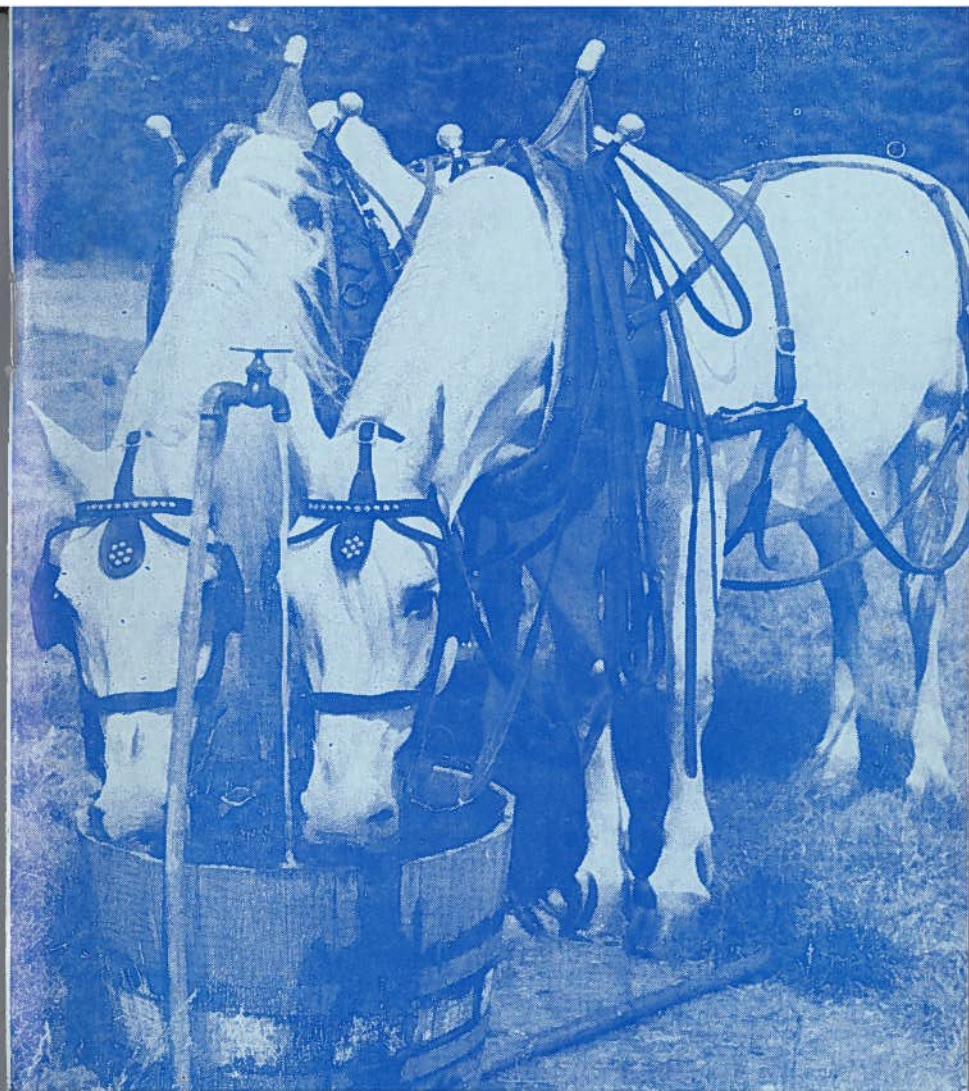

RULES and REGULATIONS

1. That competition for the following prizes be open to the world, except when otherwise specified in the Prize List.
2. **ADMISSION FEES:**
 Thursday, September 27th — Adults \$2.00; Children between the age of 6 and 14 years 50c.
 Friday, Sept. 28th — Adults \$2.00; High School Students 50c; Public School and under free.
 Saturday, Sept. 29th — Adults \$2.00; Children between the age of 6 and 14 years 50c.
 Sunday, Sept. 30th — Adults \$2.00; Children between the age of 6 and 14 years 50c.
 Thursday Nite, Sept. 27th; Friday Nite, Sept 28th; Saturday Nite, Sept. 29th — Adults \$2.00; Children between the age of 6 and 14 years, 50c.
 Grandstand will be free both afternoons and evenings.
 Limited car parking on the ground \$1.00.
3. That annual Senior membership will be \$2.00 and Junior membership \$1.00. Each exhibitor must purchase a member's ticket before making entries, a registered firm being recognized as one exhibitor.
4. All entries to be made by mail or otherwise before 8 p.m. on Wednesday, Sept. 12th to the Secretary at Caledonia.
5. Completed entry tags and Member's Tickets will be mailed to all Exhibitors whose entry lists are in our office before Wednesday, Sept. 12th.
6. Where the amount of prizes won by the exhibitor is \$5.00 or over, \$2.00 will be retained for Membership Fee for 1980.
7. Where the amount of prize money, won by the Exhibitor, is less than \$3.00 there will be no deductions in lieu of entry fees.
8. The Society will not be responsible for any loss, damage or accident occurring to any person or property on the grounds during the Fair. The Directors hope patrons of the Fair will obey orders. The Society will take all reasonable care of exhibits, but will not be responsible for any loss or damage.
9. While every possible assistance will be most cheerfully given in placing exhibits, no package or case of any kind whatsoever will be opened unless accompanied by the exhibitor or someone sent specially in charge.
10. That all articles entered for competition must be entered in strict accordance with the Prize List in order to secure a prize, the exact number and quantity stated in the Prize List being strictly adhered to.
11. No member will be allowed to make more than one entry in each case for Society Prizes with the same animal or article

unless otherwise specified. This rule not to apply to animals in herds or pens, nor to special prizes offered by persons outside the Society, but to apply to all kinds of grains, seeds, flowers, roots and vegetables, domestic manufacturers and horticultural products, in which additional specimens would necessarily be similar to the first.

12. All produce to be growth of parties exhibiting same. Every animal, fowl, article, product or chattel exhibited must be the actual bona fide property and belong absolutely to the person or persons entering or exhibiting the same. In the case of every article, product or chattel exhibited, other than livestock, the said article, product or chattel must be of the actual production, growth or manufacture, as the case may be, of the person or persons owning or exhibiting the same, except specially mentioned in the list.
13. Tickets will be placed on the work that has been exhibited before, or is entered in the wrong list, with the words "Ruled Out."
14. That the exhibitor of horses, cattle and sheep do bring them forward when called upon by the Directors, otherwise they will not be noticed.
15. No competitor will be entitled to a premium if the judges deem the stock or article unworthy of the same.
16. Any person interfering by conversation or otherwise, with the judges until after judgment is passed, shall have no prize awarded him.
17. Any exhibitor making a protest will be required to make a deposit of \$3.00, and if said protest is not sustained the said amount will be retained by the Association.
18. All protests to be made in writing as soon as possible, so that the judges in the class may be heard on it, as the Directors of the Society do not constitute a Board of Judges to hear complaints. The Directors earnestly hope that the exhibitors will not enter protests without strong grounds for doing so, as much annoyance and unpleasantness is occasioned by protests of a frivolous nature.
19. In case an error occurs in the printing of the Prize List, the Directors have the power to rectify the same.
20. The sale of lottery tickets will not be allowed on the Caledonia Fair Grounds or within 300 yards of the grounds unless sponsored by the Caledonia Agricultural Society.

GENERAL RULES FOR ALL BREEDS

Category 12, Option 2 of the Canada Department of Agriculture
Classifications are adopted for all breeds of Cattle.

SPECIAL NOTICE TO ALL BEEF AND DAIRY CATTLE
EXHIBITORS

It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to have his veterinarian conduct all necessary tests.

The Health of Animals Branch will not be conducting any tests unless an inspector happens to be on a farm for other reasons. The Regulations read as follows:

SHOWS AND EXHIBITIONS

No person in charge of a show or exhibition shall permit to be shown, and no owner or person in charge of a bovine shall show a bovine over the age of six months of age except steers, spayed heifers or official vaccinates under the age of eighteen months at a show or exhibition unless the bovine

(a) comes from a brucellosis free region or a brucellosis free listed herd and is accompanied by a certificate signed by an inspector indicating

1. the brucellosis free region or brucellosis free listed herd from which the animal came, and
2. in the case of a bovine from a brucellosis free region, that the bovine has proved negative to all tests for brucellosis required by these Regulations for animals in a brucellosis free region; or

- (b) comes from a herd of negative status in a region other than a brucellosis free region and has proved negative to a test for brucellosis conducted by an inspector or an accredited veterinarian within sixty days preceding the showing and is accompanied by a certificate signed by an inspector indicating the negative results of the brucellosis test the date on which the test was conducted and the negative status of the herd from which the animal came.

DEFINITION OF AN "ENTRY"

For the purpose of the 1979 Cattle Classification an entry shall be interpreted as follows:

All registered cattle, whether owned by one person or by more than one person (individually or jointly) which are maintained on one farm or breeding unit, are considered to be the production of one farm or breeding unit.

Therefore, only one entry per class is eligible from such farm or breeding unit, unless otherwise authorized by the fair.

"Where the same interests are involved in more than one breeding operation, such operations are considered as ONE breeding unit".

There will be no Cattle Parade to the Race Track on Friday afternoon, Sept. 28th, however, there will be a Cattle Parade in front of the Grandstand on Saturday afternoon, September 29th commencing promptly at 4:30 p.m.

NOTE: Cattle must be in the barns by 10.00 a.m. on the day that class is shown and must remain on the grounds until after 5.00 p.m. This rule will be strictly enforced.

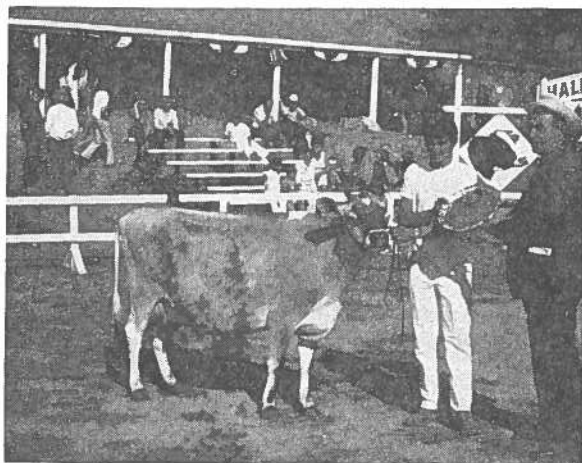

4. Animals originating from Brucellosis Free listed herd.

Please notify your local Health of Animals Office for necessary tests not later than August 15th, 1979.

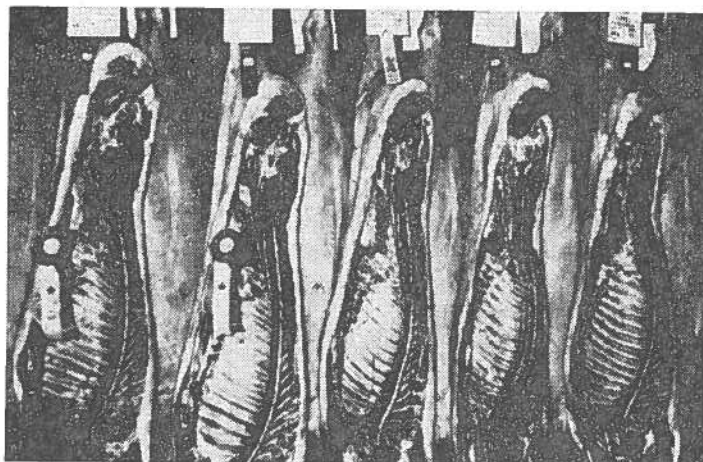

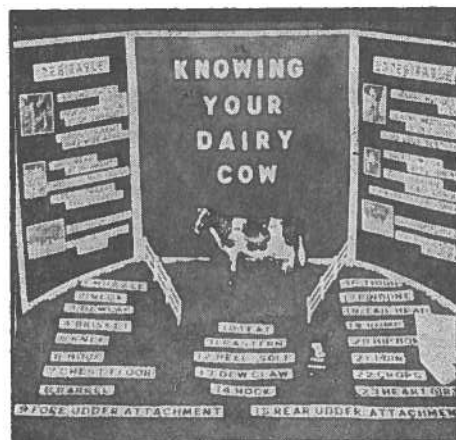

8. All Junior Livestock will be shown on Thursday, Sept. 27th.
9. No Livestock Exhibitor will be allowed in the ring without being accompanied by their Entry Card showing their Exhibitor's Number.

A SPECIAL NOTICE TO ALL BOYS AND GIRLS EXHIBITING CATTLE IN THE JUNIOR DEPARTMENT OR 4-H CLASSES

It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to have his veterinarian conduct all necessary tests.

The Health of Animals Branch will not be conducting any tests unless an inspector happens to be on a farm for other reasons. The Regulations read as follows:

SHOWS AND EXHIBITIONS

No person in charge of a show or exhibition shall permit to be shown, and no owner or person in charge of a bovine shall show a bovine over the age of six months of age except steers, spayed heifers or official vaccinates under the age of eighteen months at a show or exhibition unless the bovine

- (a) comes from a brucellosis free region or a brucellosis free listed herd and is accompanied by a certificate signed by an inspector indicating
 1. the brucellosis free region or brucellosis free listed herd from which the animal came, and
 2. in the case of a bovine from a brucellosis free region, that the bovine has proved negative to all tests for brucellosis required by these Regulations for animals in a brucellosis free region; or
- (b) comes from a herd of negative status in a region other than a brucellosis free region and has proved negative to a test for brucellosis conducted by an inspector or an accredited veterinarian within sixty days preceding the showing and is accompanied by a certificate signed by an inspector indicating the negative results of the brucellosis test, the date on which the test was conducted and the negative status of the herd from which the animal came.

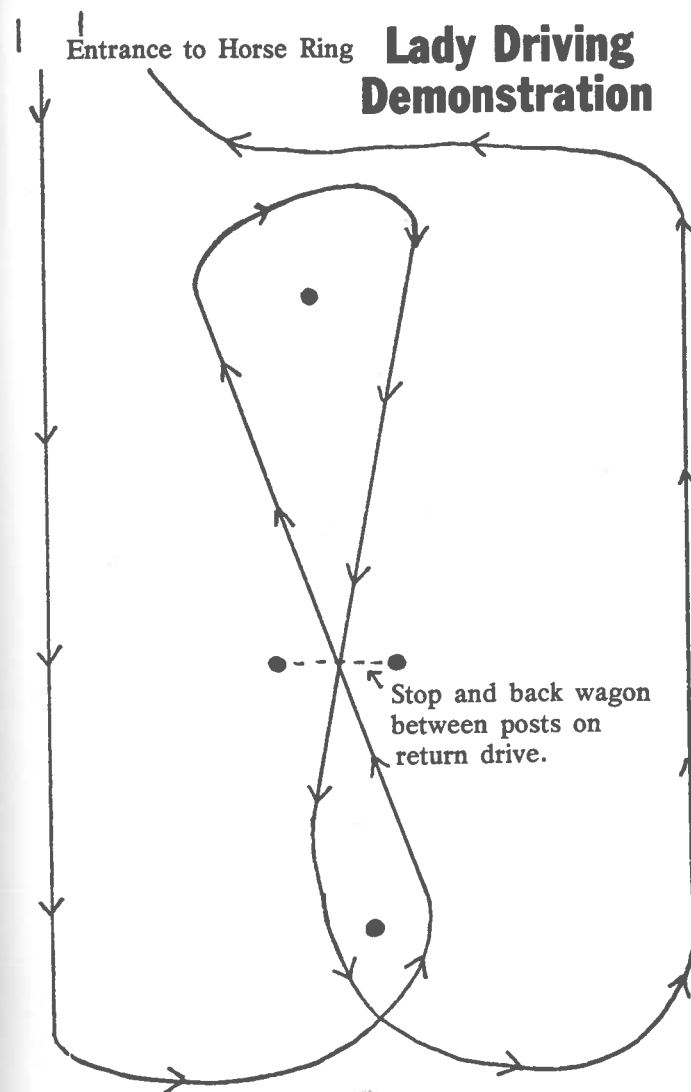

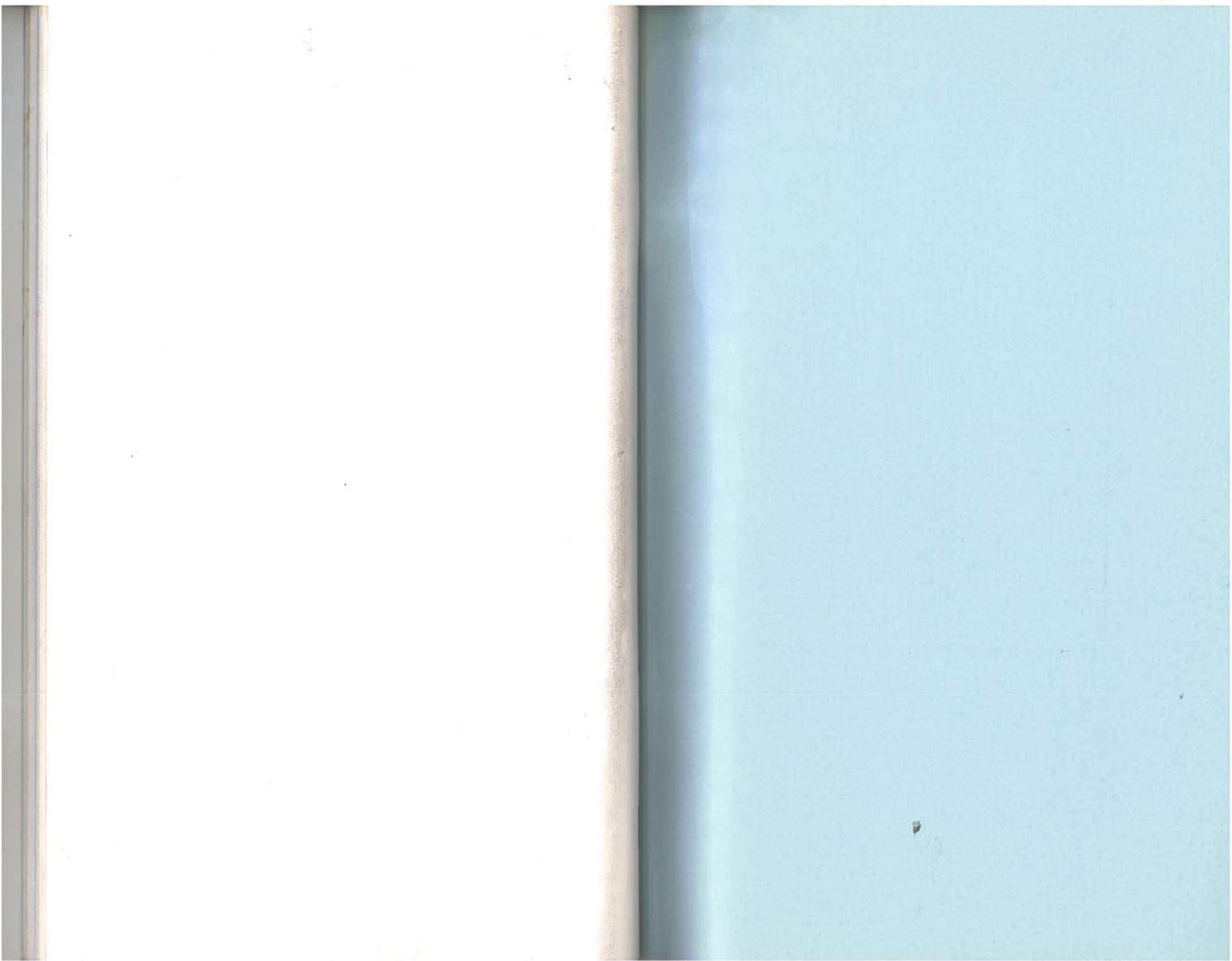
