1. That competition for the following prizes be open to the world, except when otherwise specified in the Prize List.
2. **ADMISSION FEES:**
 Thursday, September 26th — All admissions \$1 all day on Thursday.
 Friday, September 27th — Adults \$3.00, High School Students \$1.50, Public School and under free until 5 p.m.
 Saturday, September 28th — Adults \$3.00, Children between the age of 6 and 14 years 50¢.
 Sunday, September 29th — Adults \$3.00, Children between the age of 6 and 14 years 50¢.
 Friday Nite, September 27th, Saturday Nite, September 28th — Adults \$3.00, Children between the age of 6 and 14 years 50¢.
 Grandstand will be free both afternoons and evenings.
 Limited car parking on the grounds and on the square — \$1.50.
3. All exhibitors to receive an exhibitors ticket instead of a membership card.
4. That annual Senior exhibitor fee will be \$3.00 and Junior exhibitor fee \$2.00. Each exhibitor must purchase a exhibitor ticket before making entries, a registered firm being recognized as one exhibitor. Membership tickets may also be purchased for \$3.00.
5. All entries to be made by mail or otherwise before 8 p.m. on September 7th to the Secretary at Caledonia.
6. Completed entry tags and exhibitor ticket will be mailed to all Exhibitors whose entry lists are in our office before Saturday, September 7th.
7. Where the amount of prizes won by the exhibitor is over \$10.00, \$3.00 will be retained for exhibitor fee for 1986.
8. Where the amount of prizes won by the exhibitor is less than \$3.00 there will be no deductions in lieu of entry fees.
9. The Society will not be responsible for any loss, damage or accident occurring to any person or property on the grounds during the Fair. The Directors hope patrons of the Fair will obey orders. The Society will take all reasonable care of exhibits, but will not be responsible for any loss or damage.
10. While every possible assistance will be most cheerfully given in placing exhibits, no package or case of any kind whatsoever will be opened unless accompanied by the exhibitor or someone sent specially in charge.
11. That all articles entered for competition must be entered in strict accordance with the Prize List in order to secure a prize, the exact number and quantity stated in the Prize List being strictly adhered to.

12. No member will be allowed to make more than one entry in each case for Society Prizes with the same animal or article unless otherwise specified. This rule not to apply to animals in herds or pens, nor to special prizes offered by persons outside the Society, but to apply to all kinds of grains, seeds, flowers, roots and vegetables, domestic and horticultural products, in which additional specimens would necessarily be similar to the first.
13. All produce to be growth of parties exhibiting same. Every animal, fowl, article, product or chattel exhibited must be the actual bona fide property and belong absolutely to the person or persons entering or exhibiting the same. In the case of every article, product or chattel exhibited, other than livestock, the said article, product or chattel must be of the actual production, growth or manufacture, as the case may be, of the person or persons owning or exhibiting the same, except specially mentioned in the list.
14. Tickets will be placed on the work that has been exhibited before, or is entered in the wrong list, with the words "Ruled Out".
15. That the exhibitor of horses, cattle and sheep do bring them forward when called upon by the Directors, otherwise they will not be noticed.
16. No competitor will be entitled to a premium if the judges deem the stock or article unworthy of the same.
17. Any person interfering by conversation or otherwise, with the judges until after judgment is passed, shall have no prize awarded him.
18. Any exhibitor making a protest to the official judges will be required to make a deposit of \$50.00, and if said protest is not sustained the said amount will be retained by the Association.
19. All protests to be made in writing as soon as possible, so that the judges in the class may be heard on it, as the Directors of the Society do not constitute a Board of Judges to hear complaints. The Directors earnestly hope that the exhibitors will not enter protests without strong grounds for doing so, as much annoyance and unpleasantness is occasioned by protests of a frivolous nature.
20. In case an error occurs in the printing of the Prize List, the Directors have the power to rectify the same.
21. In case of insufficient funds, due to weather or other conditions, the Society reserves the right to pay only a percentage of the prizes awarded for exhibits.
22. Notice is hereby given that the Officers of the Society may, by their rules and regulations, prohibit and prevent theatrical, circus and mountebank performances, the sale of Lottery tickets, exhibitions or shows, and may prohibit the sale of cheap jewellery or other articles of a similar nature, and no games of chance or gambling will be permitted on the grounds or within 200 yards thereof; the Society may also regulate or prevent the huckstering or trafficking in fruit, goods, wares or merchandise on the Exhibition Grounds, or within 300 yards thereof.
23. All cheques for prize money must be presented at the bank by the last banking day of November.

EXHIBITOR FEES

Junior Exhibitor Fees are \$2.00 each and allow Juniors to exhibit in Junior Departments, Classes 43 and 44 only. Should Juniors wish to exhibit in other classes they must obtain a "Senior Exhibitor Card," only, at \$3.00.

However, a Senior Exhibitor Card entitles Juniors to exhibit in both the Junior and Senior Classes.

Senior Exhibitor Fees are \$3.00 each and must be obtained by every exhibitor at \$3.00.

Both Junior and Senior Exhibitor Cards entitle the holder, only to limited admission to the 1985 Caledonia Fair.

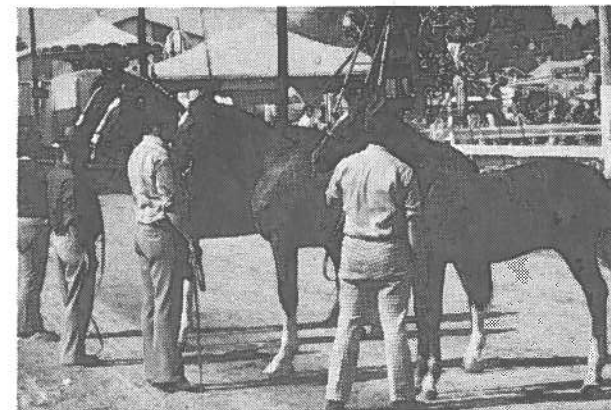
A Note To Our Exhibitors

GENERAL RULES FOR ALL BREEDS

Category 11, Option 2 of the Canada Department of Agriculture Classifications are adopted for all breeds of Cattle.

Special Notice to all Beef and Dairy Cattle Exhibitors

It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to have his veterinarian conduct all necessary tests.

The Health of Animals Branch will not be conducting any tests unless an inspector happens to be on a farm for other reasons. The Regulations read as follows:

SHOWS and EXHIBITIONS

No person in charge of a show or exhibition shall permit to be shown, and no owner or person in charge of a bovine shall show a bovine **over the age of six months of age** except steers, spayed heifers or official vaccinates under the age of eighteen months at a show or exhibition unless the bovine

(a) comes from a brucellosis free region or a brucellosis free listed herd and is accompanied by a certificate signed by an inspector indicating

1. the brucellosis free region or brucellosis free listed herd from which the animal came, and

2. in the case of a bovine from a brucellosis free region, that the bovine has proved negative to all tests for brucellosis required by these regulations for animals in a brucellosis free region; or

- (b) comes from a herd of negative status in a region other than a brucellosis free region and has proved negative to a test for brucellosis conducted by an inspector or an accredited veterinarian within sixty days preceding the showing and is accompanied by a certificate signed by an inspector indicating the negative results of the brucellosis test the date on which the test was conducted and the negative status of the herd from which the animal came.

DEFINITION OF AN "ENTRY"

For the purpose of the 1985 Cattle Classification an entry shall be interpreted as follows:

All registered cattle, whether owned by one person or by more than one person (individually or jointly) which are maintained on one farm or breeding unit, are considered to be the production of one farm or breeding unit.

Therefore, only one entry per class is eligible from such farm or breeding unit, unless otherwise authorized by the fair.

"Where the same interests are involved in more than one breeding operation, such operations are considered as ONE breeding unit".

NOTE: Cattle must be in the barns by 10:00 a.m. on the day that class is shown and must remain on the grounds until after 5:00 p.m. This rule will be strictly enforced.

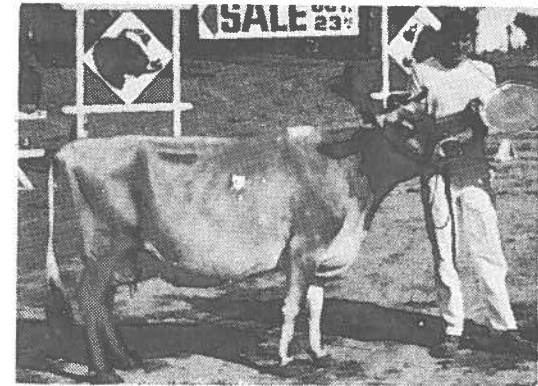

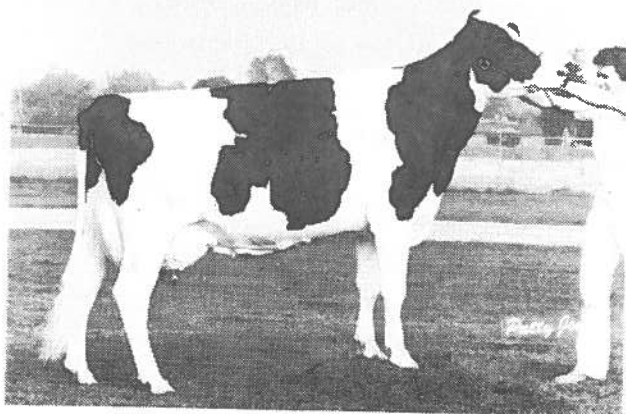

All Registered Sheep whether owned by one person or by more than one person (individually or jointly) which are maintained on one farm or breeding unit, are considered to be the production of one farm or breeding unit. Where the same or common interest are involved in more than one sheep breeding operation, such operations are considered as one breeding unit. Only one entry per class is eligible from such farm or breeding unit, except the fair may authorize two entries per class in a maximum of two classes. All entries must be owned by and registered in the name of the exhibitor.

Each breed must be shown separately and have at least three (3) exhibitors to be eligible for the Federal prize money contribution.

 - Caledonia Agricultural Society Balance
- Competition will be restricted to:
 - Breeders residing within District 4 comprised of the Regions of Hamilton-Wentworth, Haldimand-Norfolk, Niagara and Brant Count.
- Sheep must be on the grounds not later than 10:00 a.m. No animal will be permitted to leave the grounds previous to 5:00 p.m.
- Any breed with less than 3 exhibitors must go in Any Other Breed Class.
- All animals must be registered in the name of the exhibitor, except for Commercial Classes. Exhibitors must present registration certificates at the time of showing. Any animal will be barred if the exhibitor fails to provide proof of ownership.
- Exhibitors will not be permitted to make more than 2 entries in classes for single animals and more than 1 entry in flock and market lamb classes.
- Substitute animals may be entered before 9:30 a.m. in place of entries already made.
- Each exhibitor shall pay a 1985 Exhibitor Fee (\$3.00) to the Caledonia Agricultural Society. Entry fee will be 20 percent deducted from prize money won.
- Each exhibitor must be a member of the District 4 Ontario Sheep Association. Membership may be obtained at time of entry. 4-H members owning their own lambs will be exempt from \$10.00 membership to District 4.
- All classes must be judged in the ring to be eligible for prize money regardless of the number of entries.
- General rules of the Caledonia Fair will apply in all cases.

- To be eligible for Federal Prize Money, each breed must be shown separately and have at least 3 exhibitors and at least 12 animals at Class A or B Fairs.
- Entries in "full mouth milk teeth" classes must have completed their Record of Performance (R.O.P.) test. Beginning in 1980, all entries will be requested to have completed testing. This rule applies to pure bred classes only.

It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to have his veterinarian conduct all necessary tests.

The Health of Animals Branch will not be conducting any tests unless an inspector happens to be on a farm for other reasons.

The Regulations read as follows:

SHOWS AND EXHIBITIONS

No person in charge of a show or exhibition shall permit to be shown, and no owner or person in charge of a bovine shall show a bovine or official vaccinates under the age of eighteen months at a show or exhibition unless the bovine.
