

RULES and REGULATIONS

- 1. That competition for the following prizes be open to the world, except when otherwise specified in the Prize List.
- 2. ADMISSION FEES:

Thursday, September 26th—Adults \$1.50, Children between the age of 6 and 14 years 50c.

Friday, Sept. 27th—Adults \$1.50, High School Students 50c, Public School and under free.

Saturday, September 28th—Adults \$1.50, Children between the age of 6 and 14 years 50c.

Sunday, Sept. 29th—Adults \$1.50, Children between the age of 6 and 14 years 50c.

Thursday Nite, Sept. 26th; Friday Nite, Sept 27th; Saturday Nite, Sept. 28th—Adults \$1.50, Children between the age of 6 and 14 years, 50c.

Grandstand will be free both afternoons and evenings. Limited car parking on the grounds 50c.

- 3. That annual Senior membership will be \$2.00 and Junior membership \$1.00. Each exhibitor must purchase a member's ticket before making entries, a registered firm being recognized as one exhibitor.
- 4. All entries to be made by mail or otherwise before 8 p.m. on Monday, Sept. 23rd, 1974 to the Secretary at Caledonia.
- Completed entry tags and Member's Tickets will be mailed to all Exhibitors whose entry lists are in our office before Saturday, September 21st.
- 6. Where the amount of prizes won by the exhibitor is \$5.00 or over, \$2.00 will be retained for Membership Fee for 1975.
- Where the amount of prize money, won by the Exhibitor, is less than \$3.00 there will be no deductions in lieu of entry fees.
- 8. The Society will not be responsible for any loss, damage or accident occurring to any person or property on the grounds during the Fair. The Directors hope patrons of the Fair will obey orders. The Society will take all reasonable care of exhibits, but will not be responsible for any loss or damage.
- While every possible assistance will be most cheerfully given in placing exhibits, no package or case of any kind whatsoever will be opened unless accompanied by the exhibitor or someone sent specially in charge.
- 10. That all articles entered for competition must be entered in strict accordance with the Prize List in order to secure a prize, the exact number and quantity stated in the Prize List being strictly adhered to.
- 11. No member will be allowed to make more than one entry in each case for Society Prizes with the same animal or article unless otherwise specified. This rule not to apply to animals

in herds or pens, nor to special prizes offered by persons outside the Society, but to apply to all kinds of grains, seeds, flowers, roots and vegetables, dairy products, domestic manufacturers and horticultural products, in which additional specimens would necessarily be similar to the first.

- 12. All produce to be growth of parties exhibiting same. Every animal, fowl, article, product or chattel exhibited must be the actual bona fide property and belong absolutely to the person or persons entering or exhibiting the same. In the case of every article, product or chattel exhibited, other than live stock, the said article, product or chattel must be of the actual production, growth or manufacture, as the case may be, of the person or persons owning or exhibiting the same, except specially mentioned in the list.
- 13. Tickets will be placed on the work that has been exhibited before, or is entered in the wrong list, with the words "Ruled Out."
- 14. That the exhibitor of horses, cattle, sheep and pigs do bring them forward when called upon by the Directors, otherwise they will not be noticed.
- 15. No competitor will be entitled to a premium if the judges deem the stock or article unworthy of the same.
- Any person interfering by conversation or otherwise, with the judges until after judgment is passed, shall have no prize
- 17. Any exhibitor making a protest will be required to make a amount will be retained by the Association.
- 18. All protests to be made in writing as soon as possible, so that the judges in the class may be heard on it, as the Directors of the Society do not constitute a Board of Judges to hear will not enter protests without strong grounds for doing so, tests of a frivolous nature.

All cattle being exhibited at the 1974 Caledonia Fair will require a negative test for Brucellosis conducted within 60 days of the opening day of the Fair, except:

- 1. Official Brucellosis vaccinates under 24 months of age.
- 2. Bulls and heifer calves under 8 months of age.
- 3. Steers.
- 4. Animals originating from Brucellosis Free listed herd.

Please notify your local Health of Animals Office for necessary tests not later than August 20, 1974. No cattle will be allowed to enter the Fair unless they meet the above requirements.

DEFINITION OF AN "ENTRY"

For the purpose of the 1974 Cattle Classification an entry shall be interpreted as follows:

All registered cattle, whether owned by one person or by more than one person (individually or jointly) which are maintained on one farm or breeding unit, are considered to be the production of one farm or breeding unit.

Therefore, only one entry per class is eligible from such farm or breeding unit, unless otherwise authorized by the fair.

"Where the same interests are involved in more than one breeding operation, such operations are considered as ONE breeding unit".
