PICKLED PUMPKIN

5-6 ibs. Pumpkin pared 1 tsp whole cloves
1 pt cider vinegar 1 tbsp. cinnamon stick, broken
3 lbs sugar 2 pieces crystallized ginger

Cut pumpkin into 1 inch cubes. Bring vinegar & sugar to a boil & simmer until sugar is dissolved. Place cloves, cinnamon & ginger in a bag. Add to the syrup & boil 5 minutes. Add pumpkin & bring mixture back to a fast, rolling boil. Boil over low heat exactly 25 minutes, stirring often. Remove the spice bag. Place pumpkin in sterilized jars, pour the vinegar syrup on top to completely cover & seal. Yields 5 to 6 pints of pickles.
