MEMBERSHIPS

Junior Memberships are \$1.00 each and allow Juniors to exhibit in Junior Departments, Classes 43 and 44 only. Should Juniors wish to exhibit in other classes they must obtain a "Senior Membership", only, at \$2.00.

However, a Senior Membership entitles Juniors to exhibit in both the Junior and Senior Classes.

Senior Memberships are \$2.00 each and must be obtained by every exhibitor at \$2.00.

Both Junior and Senior Memberships entitle the holder, only to limited admission to the 1977 Caledonia Fair.

A Note To Our Exhibitors

Each year it becomes more essential that all entries for the Exhibition Hall be received well in advance of our opening dates so that we may operate a smooth running Fair. Entries in these Departments MUST be received by Wednesday, September 21st however, two or three weeks before that date would be greatly appreciated. We do not encourage added entries, nevertheless, we will continue to cheerfully allow up to five added entries on Wednesday evening, September 28th when the exhibits are brought in, to any Exhibitor who has forwarded their main list well in advance of our closing dead-line. The Hall Exhibit and Poultry will be removed on Sunday afternoon very promptly after 5:00 o'clock.

A SPECIAL NOTE:

No exhibit can be removed from the Exhibition Hall before 5:00 p.m. on Sunday afternoon, October 2nd.

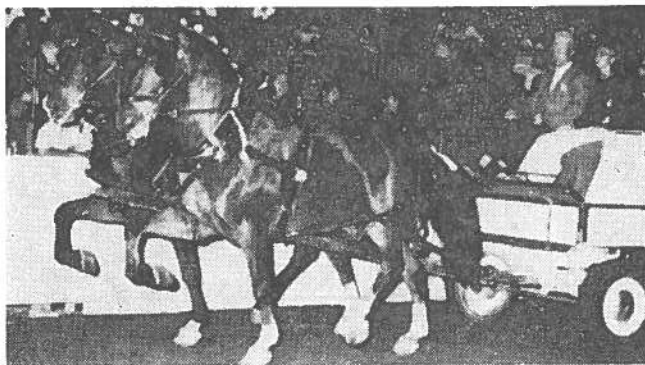
RULES and REGULATIONS

1. That competition for the following prizes be open to the world, except when otherwise specified in the Prize List.
2. **ADMISSION FEES:**
 Thursday, September 29th — Adults \$2.00; Children between the age of 6 and 14 years 50c.
 Friday, Sept. 30th — Adults \$2.00; High School Students 50c; Public School and under free.
 Saturday, Oct. 1st — Adults \$2.00; Children between the age of 6 and 14 years 50c.
 Sunday, Oct. 2nd — Adults \$2.00; Children between the age of 6 and 14 years 50c.
 Thursday Nite, Sept. 29th; Friday Nite, Sept. 30th; Saturday Nite, Oct. 1st — Adults \$2.00; Children between the age of 6 and 14 years, 50c.
 Grandstand will be free both afternoons and evenings.
 Limited car parking on the ground \$1.00.
3. That annual Senior membership will be \$2.00 and Junior membership \$1.00. Each exhibitor must purchase a member's ticket before making entries, a registered firm being recognized as one exhibitor.
4. All entries to be made by mail or otherwise before 8 p.m. on Wednesday, Sept. 21st to the Secretary at Caledonia.
5. Completed entry tags and Member's Tickets will be mailed to all Exhibitors whose entry lists are in our office before Wednesday, Sept. 21st.
6. Where the amount of prizes won by the exhibitor is \$5.00 or over, \$2.00 will be retained for Membership Fee for 1978.
7. Where the amount of prize money, won by the Exhibitor, is less than \$3.00 there will be no deductions in lieu of entry fees.
8. The Society will not be responsible for any loss, damage or accident occurring to any person or property on the grounds during the Fair. The Directors hope patrons of the Fair will obey orders. The Society will take all reasonable care of exhibits, but will not be responsible for any loss or damage.
9. While every possible assistance will be most cheerfully given in placing exhibits, no package or case of any kind whatsoever will be opened unless accompanied by the exhibitor or someone sent specially in charge.
10. That all articles entered for competition must be entered in strict accordance with the Prize List in order to secure a prize, the exact number and quantity stated in the Prize List being strictly adhered to.
11. No member will be allowed to make more than one entry in each case for Society Prizes with the same animal or article

unless otherwise specified. This rule not to apply to animals in herds or pens, nor to special prizes offered by persons outside the Society, but to apply to all kinds of grains, seeds, flowers, roots and vegetables, domestic manufacturers and horticultural products, in which additional specimens would necessarily be similar to the first.

12. All produce to be growth of parties exhibiting same. Every animal, fowl, article, product or chattel exhibited must be the actual bona fide property and belong absolutely to the person or persons entering or exhibiting the same. In the case of every article, product or chattel exhibited, other than livestock, the said article, product or chattel must be of the actual production, growth or manufacture, as the case may be, of the person or persons owning or exhibiting the same, except specially mentioned in the list.
13. Tickets will be placed on the work that has been exhibited before, or is entered in the wrong list, with the words "Ruled Out."
14. That the exhibitor of horses, cattle and sheep do bring them forward when called upon by the Directors, otherwise they will not be noticed.
15. No competitor will be entitled to a premium if the judges deem the stock or article unworthy of the same.
16. Any person interfering by conversation or otherwise, with the judges until after judgment is passed, shall have no prize awarded him.
17. Any exhibitor making a protest will be required to make a deposit of \$3.00, and if said protest is not sustained the said amount will be retained by the Association.
18. All protests to be made in writing as soon as possible, so that the judges in the class may be heard on it, as the Directors of the Society do not constitute a Board of Judges to hear complaints. The Directors earnestly hope that the exhibitors will not enter protests without strong grounds for doing so, as such annoyance and unpleasantness is occasioned by protests of a frivolous nature.
19. In case an error occurs in the printing of the Prize List, the Directors have the power to rectify the same.
20. The sale of lottery tickets will not be allowed on the Caledonia Fair Grounds or within 300 yards of the grounds unless sponsored by the Caledonia Agricultural Society.

All cattle being exhibited at the 1977 Caledonia Fair will require a negative test for Brucellosis conducted within 60 days of the opening day of the Fair, except:

1. Official Brucellosis vaccinates under 18 months of age.
2. Bulls and heifer calves under 8 months of age.
3. Steers.
4. Animals originating from Brucellosis Free listed herd.

Please notify your local Health of Animals Office for necessary tests not later than August 15, 1977. No cattle will be allowed to enter the Fair unless they meet the above requirements.

DEFINITION OF AN "ENTRY"

For the purpose of the 1977 Cattle Classification an entry shall be interpreted as follows:

All registered cattle, whether owned by one person or by more than one person (individually or jointly) which are maintained on one farm or breeding unit, are considered to be the production of one farm or breeding unit.

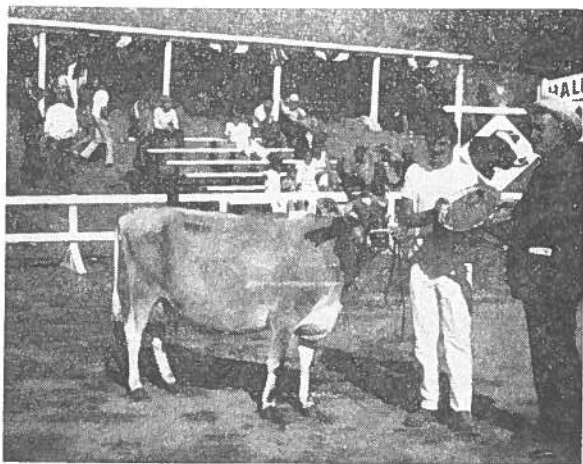

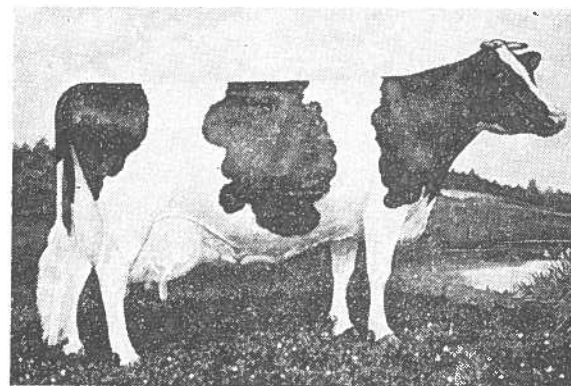

Option 2 of the Federal Department of Agriculture Classifications is adopted with category 13 of the 1977 Prize Money Schedule.

Exhibitors are limited to one entry per Section, however, the Caledonia Fair Directors have authorized two entries per Section to a maximum of two Sections.

The Exhibitor has his choice of Sections in which to make his second entries.

The Exhibitor shall be the owner as officially recorded on the registration certificate immediately prior to the commencement of judging.

SPECIAL NOTICE TO ALL EXHIBITORS

All cattle being exhibited at the Caledonia Fair will require a Negative Test for Brucellosis conducted within 60 days of the opening day of the Fair except—

1. Official Brucellosis vaccinates under 18 months of age.
2. Bulls and heifer calves under 8 months of age.
3. Steers.
4. Animals originating from Brucellosis Free listed herd.

Please notify your local Health of Animals Office for necessary tests not later than August 15th, 1977.

No cattle will be allowed to enter the Fair unless they meet the above requirements.

All animals to be on grounds by 10. o'clock Friday, September 30th. Judging will commence promptly at 12.30 o'clock noon.

Cattle must not be removed from the grounds before 5:00 p.m.

Entries must be forwarded to the Fair Secretary, Emerson W. Peart on special forms supplied, on or before September 10th, 1977.

NOTE—Cattle not entered by Monday, September 12th cannot be exhibited.
