1. That competition for the following prizes be open to the world, except when otherwise specified in the Prize List.

2. ADMISSION FEES: Thursday, September 28th — All admissions \$2.00 all day on Thursday — SENIORS' DAY.

Friday, September 29th — Adults \$4.00, High School Students \$2.00, Public School and under free until 5 p.m.

Saturday, September 30th — Adults \$4.00, Children between the age of 6 and 14 years \$1.00.

Sunday, October 1st — Adults \$4.00, Children between the age of 6 and 14 \$1.00.

Friday Night, September 29th, Saturday Night, September 30th — Adults \$4.00, Children between the age of 6 and 14 years \$1.00.

Grandstand will be free both afternoons and evenings.

Limited car parking on the grounds and on the square — \$2.00.

3. All exhibitors to receive an exhibitors ticket instead of a membership card.

4. That annual Senior exhibitor fee will be \$4.00 and Junior exhibitor fee \$2.00. Each exhibitor must purchase an exhibitor ticket before making entries, a registered firm being recognized as one exhibitor. Membership may also be purchased for \$4.00. Membership does not entitle the holder to admission to the fair.

5. All entries to be made by mail or otherwise by September 15th to the Secretary at Caledonia.

6. Completed entry tags and exhibitor ticket will be mailed to all Exhibitors whose entry lists are in our office before September 11th.

7. Where the amount of prizes won by the exhibitor is over \$10.00, \$4.00 will be retained for exhibitor fee for 1990.

8. Where the amount of prizes won by the exhibitor is less than \$3.00 there will be no deductions in lieu of entry fees.

9. The Society will not be responsible for any loss, damage or accident occurring to any person or property on the grounds during the Fair. The Directors hope patrons of the Fair will obey orders. The Society will take all reasonable care of exhibits, but will not be responsible for any loss or damage.

10. While every possible assistance will be most cheerfully given in placing exhibits, no package or case of any kind whatsoever will be opened unless accompanied by the exhibitor or someone sent specially in charge.

11. That all articles entered for competition must be entered in strict accordance with the Prize List in order to secure a prize, the exact number and quantity stated in the Prize List being strictly adhered to.

12. No member will be allowed to make more than one entry in each case for Society Prizes with the same animal or article unless otherwise specified. This rule not to apply to animals in herds or pens, nor to special prizes offered by persons outside the Society, but to apply to all kinds of grains, seeds, flowers, roots and vegetables, domestic and horticultural products, in which additional specimens would necessarily be similar to the first.

13. All produce to be growth of parties exhibiting same. Every animal, fowl, article, product or chattel exhibited must be the actual bona fide property and belong absolutely to the person or persons entering or exhibiting the same. In the case of every article, product or chattel exhibited, other than livestock, the said article, product or chattel must be of the actual production, growth or manufacture, as the case may be, of the person or persons owning or exhibiting the same, except specially mentioned in the list.

14. Tickets will be placed on the work that has been exhibited before, or is entered in the wrong list, with the words "Ruled Out".
15. That the exhibitor of horses, cattle and sheep do bring them forward when called upon by the Directors, otherwise they will not be noticed.
16. No competitor will be entitled to a premium if the judges deem the stock or article unworthy of the same.
17. Any person interfering by conversation or otherwise, with the judges until after judgment is passed, shall have no prize awarded him.
18. Any exhibitor making a protest to the official judges will be required to make a deposit of \$50.00, and if said protest is not sustained the said amount will be retained by the Association.
19. All protests to be made in writing as soon as possible, so that the judges in the class may be heard on it, as the Directors of the Society do not constitute a Board of Judges to hear complaints. The Directors earnestly hope that the exhibitors will not enter protests without strong grounds for doing so, as much annoyance and unpleasantness is occasioned by protests of a frivolous nature.
20. In case an error occurs in the printing of the Prize List, the Directors have the power to rectify the same.
21. In case of insufficient funds, due to weather or other conditions, the Society reserves the right to pay only a percentage of the prizes awarded for exhibits.
- 21a. Should a livestock show be cancelled due to weather or other conditions, the Society reserves the right to pay only a percentage of the prize money for that portion and/or a mileage consideration, at the final decision of the Society executive.
22. Notice is hereby given that the Officers of the Society may, by their rules and regulations, prohibit and prevent theatrical, circus and mountebank performances, the sale of lottery tickets, exhibitions or shows, and may prohibit the sale of cheap jewellery or other articles of a similar nature, and no games of chance or gambling will be permitted on the grounds or within 200 yards thereof; the Society may also regulate or prevent the huckstering or trafficking in fruit, goods, wares or merchandise on the Exhibition Grounds, or within 300 yards thereof.
23. **ALL CHEQUES FOR PRIZE MONEY MUST BE PRESENTED AT THE BANK BY THE LAST BANKING DAY IN NOVEMBER.**

HOLD HARMLESS AGREEMENT

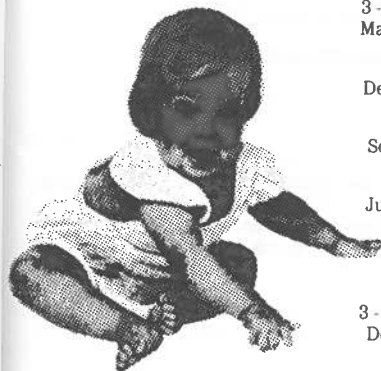

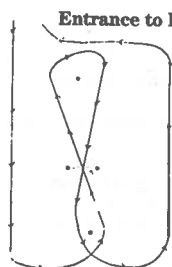

Special Notice to all Beef and Dairy Cattle Exhibitors

It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to have his veterinarian conduct all necessary tests.

The Health of Animals Branch will not be conducting any tests unless an inspector happens to be on a farm for other reasons.

DEFINITION OF AN "ENTRY"

For the purpose of the 1989 Cattle Classification an entry shall be interpreted as follows:

All registered cattle, whether owned by one person or by more than one person (individually or jointly) which are maintained on one farm or breeding unit, are considered to be the production of one farm or breeding unit.

Therefore, only one entry per class is eligible from such farm or breeding unit, unless otherwise authorized by the fair.

"Where the same interests are involved in more than one breeding operation, such operations are considered as ONE breeding unit."

NOTE: Cattle must be in the barns by 10:00 a.m. on the day the class is shown and must remain on the grounds until after 5:00 p.m. this rule will be strictly enforced.

Breeders residing within District 4 comprised of the Regions of Hamilton-Wentworth, Haldimand-Norfolk, Niagara and Brant County.
3. Sheep must be on the grounds not later than 9:00 a.m. Judging to commence at 10 a.m. No animal will be permitted to leave the grounds previous to 5:00 p.m.
4. All animals must be registered in the name of the exhibitor, except for Commercial Classes. Exhibitors must present registration certificates at the time of showing. Any animal will be barred if the exhibitor fails to provide proof of ownership.
5. Exhibitors will not be permitted to make more than 2 entries in 2 classes for single animals and more than 1 entry in flock and market lamb classes.

6. Substitute animals may be entered before 9:30 a.m. in place of entries already made.
7. Each exhibitor shall pay a 1989 Exhibitor Fee (\$4.00) to the Caledonia Agricultural Society. Entry free will be 20 percent deducted from prize money won.

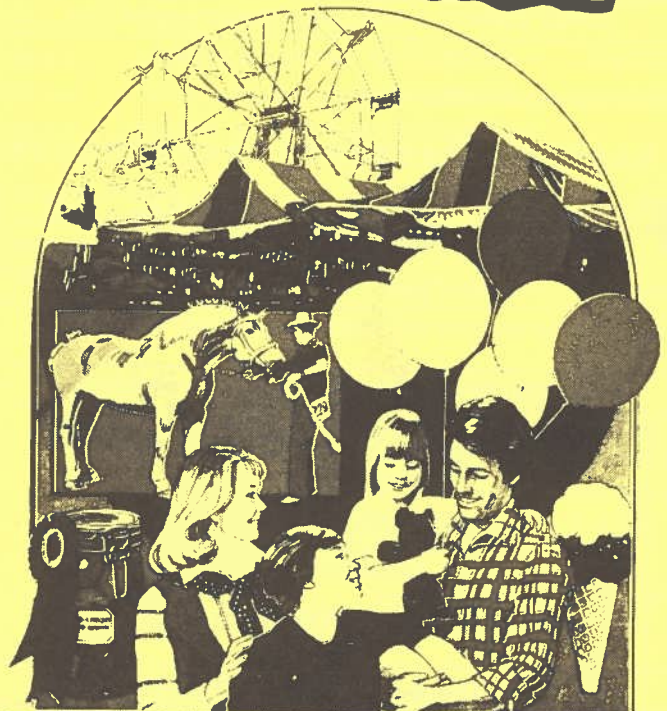

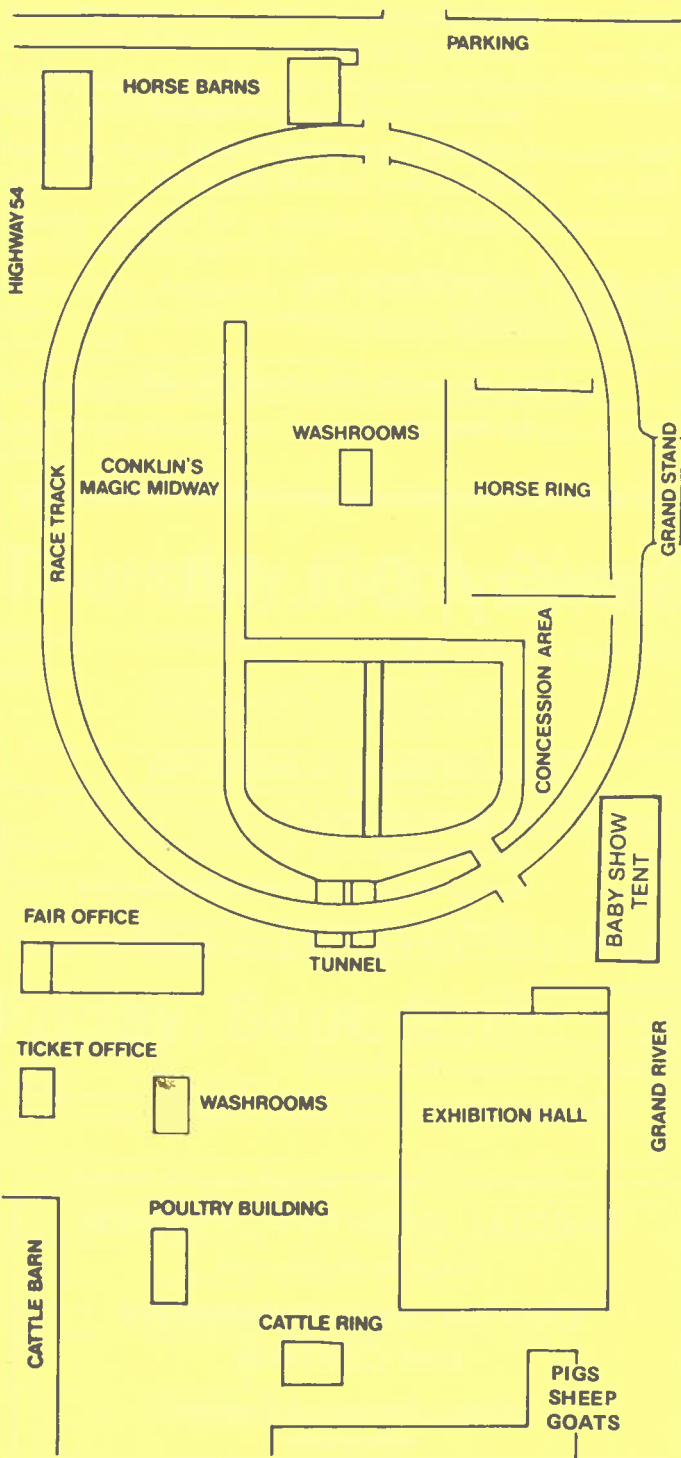

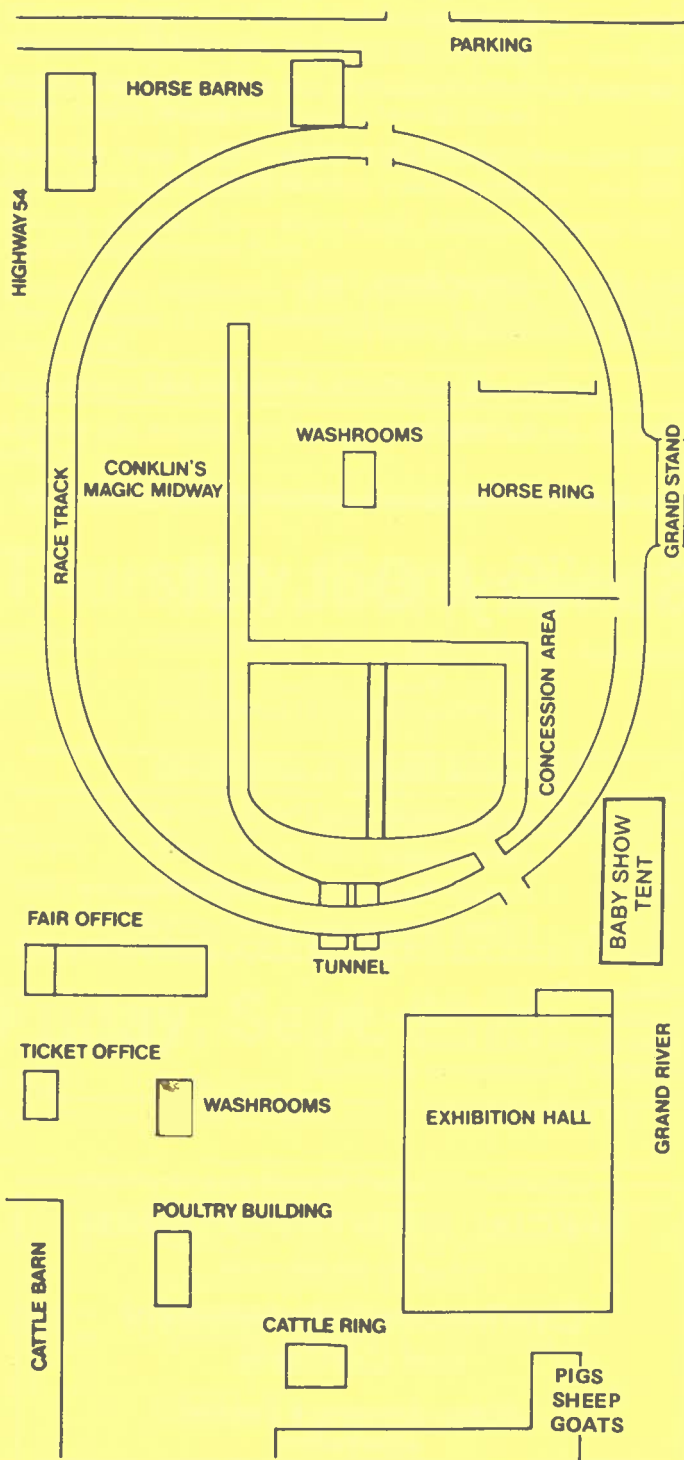
