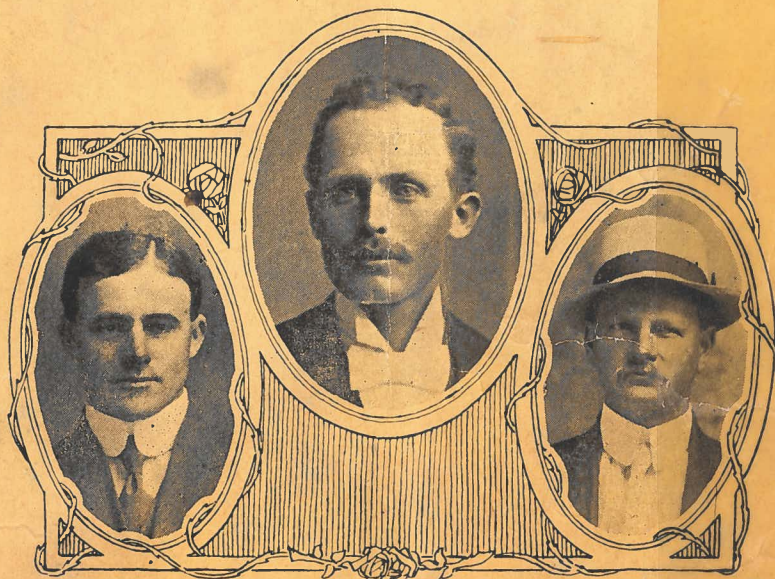

Rules and Regulations

1. That competition for the following prizes be open to the world, except when otherwise specified in the prize list.
2. The annual membership fee if paid on or before Thursday, Oct. 10, 1912, will be \$1.00; after that date \$1.50 will be charged. Each exhibitor must purchase a member's ticket before making entries, a registered firm being recognized as one exhibitor. If member's fee is not enclosed entries will be refused.
3. Each member will be supplied with two admission tickets and a member's ticket.
4. That grain, seeds, roots, vegetables, horticultural products, plants, flowers, dairy products, agricultural implements, domestic manufactures, ladies' work and fine arts, be on the ground and put in order at 10 a.m., on the first day of the fair, Thursday, Oct. 10, and to remain until 4.30 p.m. on the second day.
5. Poultry must be on the grounds and put in order before 12 o'clock noon on the first day of the Fair and remain until the close of the exhibition on Friday, Oct. 11, at 4.30 p.m.
6. Admission to the grounds 25c. each time, children under 12 years 10c.
7. All buggy horses not intended for exhibition, driving on the grounds will be charged 40c., teams 75c., and each person in vehicle 25c., admission to Grand Stand 25 and 15c.
8. All articles of manufacture, including ladies' work must have been manufactured during the present year.
9. Not less than one bushel of each kind of grain must be shown unless otherwise specified in the prize list, and the grain and roots must be the growth of 1912 and grown by the competitor, except clover seed which may be the growth of 1911.
10. All produce to be the growth of parties exhibiting the same.
11. No member allowed to make more than one entry in each class for Society's prizes with the same animal or article. This rule not to apply to animals in herds or pens, nor to special prizes offered by persons outside the Society, but to apply to all kinds of grains, seeds, flour, roots and vegetables, dairy products, domestic manufactures and horticultural products, in which additional specimens would necessarily be similar to the first.
12. None but manufacturers or their agents must exhibit agricultural machinery.
13. No articles to be removed from the drill hall or root and vegetable hall until 4.30 p.m. on the second day of the Fair.
14. Every animal, fowl, article, product or chattel exhibited must be the actual bona fide property and belong absolutely to the person or persons entering or exhibiting the same. In the case of every article, product or chattel exhibited, other than live stock, the said article, product or chattel must be of the actual production, growth or manufacture, as the case may be, of the person or persons owning or exhibiting the same, except specially mentioned in list.
15. That no persons be allowed to ride or drive horses on the grounds faster than a walk, except when shown and ordered to do so by the judges, under penalty of immediate removal from the grounds.

16. The exhibitor's name must not be in the bag, etc., in which his produce is exhibited.
17. That no persons be allowed to attach any prize or badge obtained at other fairs on any animal or article exhibited until after the judges have made their awards.
18. That all articles entered for competition must be entered in strict accordance with the Prize List in order to secure a prize, the exact number and quantity stated in the Prize List being strictly adhered to.
19. That every bull must have a ring in its nose; horses, colts, cows and calves be led on the grounds and be secured by the head, and pigs and sheep confined in pens; and that owners shall comply with such minor regulations for their safe custody and fair and complete exhibition as the committee of management may suggest.
20. That the exhibitors of horses, cattle and sheep do bring them forward when called upon by the judges, otherwise they will not be noticed by the judges.
21. No competitor will be entitled to a premium if the judges deem the stock or article unworthy of the same.
22. Any person interfering, by conversation or otherwise, with the judges until after judgment is passed, shall have no prize awarded him.
23. Judges will please sign and hand in their list of awards to the Secretary, and remain until their books have been signed by the Secretary, in order that cases of error or doubt may be more promptly and easily made right, and they are particularly requested not to leave the grounds until they have ascertained from the Secretary that there are no protests against the awards in their department.
24. Any exhibitor or interested person making a protest will be required to make a deposit of \$2, and if said protest is not sustained the said amount will be retained by the Association.
25. All protests to be made in writing as soon as possible, so that the judges in the class may be heard on it, as the Directors of the Society do not constitute a board of judges to hear complaints. The Directors earnestly hope that the exhibitors will not enter protests without strong grounds for doing so, as much annoyance and unpleasantness is often occasioned by protests of a frivolous nature.
26. This Society will not be responsible for any loss, damage or accident occurring to any person or property on the grounds during the Fair. The directors hope patrons of the Fair will obey orders. The Society will take all reasonable care of exhibits but will not be responsible for any loss or damage.
27. Notice is hereby given that any kind of gambling, theatricals, circus or mountebank performances, exhibitions or shows, also the huckstering or trafficking in spirituous or intoxicating drinks are not allowed within 300 yards of the exhibition grounds, and that 31 Vic., Chap. 29, clauses 56, 57 and 58 relating thereto, will be enforced if any deviations from the regulations occur.
28. Whilst every possible assistance will be most cheerfully given in placing exhibits, no package or case of any kind whatsoever will be opened unless accompanied by the exhibitor or some one sent specially in charge.
29. Tickets will be placed on the work that has been exhibited before, or is entered in the wrong class, with the words "Ruled Out."

ENTRIES.

30. All entries to be made by mail or otherwise before 8 a.m. on Tuesday, Oct. 8, 1912, to the Secretary at Caledonia. Parties making entries after that date must pay an additional fee of 50c.

31. Exhibitors will find their entry cards and member's ticket ready for them at the Secretary's office on the first day of the Fair, or will be sent by mail if asked to do so.

PREMIUMS.

32. Exhibitors winning special prizes will call at 4.30 p.m. on Friday, the second day of the Fair, for special prize orders. The Treasurer will commence to pay prize money on Friday, Oct. 25th. Cheques will be mailed to prize winners for the amount standing to their credit on the Secretary's books if asked to do so.

33. Where the amount of prizes won by an exhibitor is \$5.00 or over, \$1.00 will be retained for membership fee for 1913.

JUDGES, ETC.

34. Judges for each day will be at the Secretary's office on the grounds at 11 a.m.

35. Judging will commence at 12 o'clock each day.

36. A luncheon will be prepared on the grounds for the judges at 11 o'clock each day.

37. The members of the different committees will be on the grounds at 9 a.m. each day.

SPECIAL NOTES.

The Drill Hall will be closed at 4.30 o'clock on Friday, and everyone must leave the hall. Tickets will be supplied by the Secretary to all exhibitors for admission, when they can take down their goods in quietness. Tickets can be had at the Secretary's office.

The association desires to thank those persons whose liberal contributions have enabled them to make such valuable additions to the prize list.

All parties entering double carriage or road horses must pay an extra fee of 75c., and single carriage or road horses will be charged 40c extra.

In case an error occurs in the printing of the prize list, the Directors have the power to rectify the same.

Horses to be shown second day, and must be on the grounds at 10 a. m. Exhibitors must bring on horses promptly when called.

Draught horses to be shown before lumber wagons in farm harness, General Purpose horses before democrats, Carriage and Road horses before ordinary buggies, and Colts to halter. Three-year-old colts may be shown in harness as teams.

In registered class mares and colts may compete for progeny prize and not necessarily belong to the exhibitor.

An entrance fee will be charged in Carriage and Road class—Single horse in harness 40c, team 75c., and must be paid at time of making entry.

Three year old colts and brood mares can be shown in the team classes after showing in their own class.

Cattle

All exhibitors of pure-bred stock must produce certificates if required by the judges. Cattle that have been shown in any other class cannot compete as fat cattle. Three-year old cows must be giving milk or be evidently in calf.

All animals will be called into the ring for examination after 12 o'clock second day of Fair. Owners or attendants must be prepared to bring them out when called for, or forfeit claims for any premiums. All grade animals must be from a pure-bred sire.

In case where there is no competition, only two prizes awarded.
