

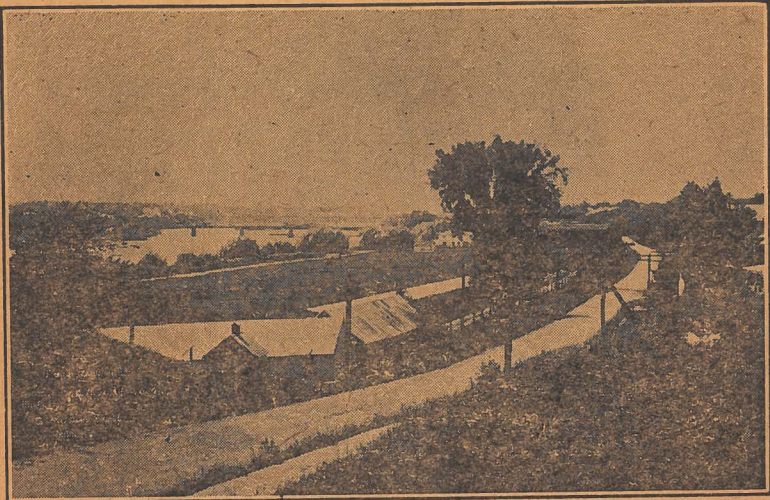

1. Dominion Harness Horse Association rules to govern.
2. Five to enter and four to start.
3. Horses eligible Oct. 1, 1928.
4. Trotters allowed 5 seconds in pacing classes.
5. Five per cent of purse to enter and five per cent additional from winners.
6. Purses divided 50, 25, 15 and 10 per cent.
7. Right is reserved by the Association to change the order of the program, to reject any entry, and postpone or declare off any event not filling satisfactorily or for any other cause.

Rules and Regulations

1. That competition for the following prizes be open to the world, except when otherwise specified in the Prize List:

2. That annual membership fee if paid on or before Thursday, October 4th, 1928 will be \$1.00; after that date \$1.50 will be charged. Each exhibitor must purchase a Member's Ticket before making entries, a registered firm being recognized as one exhibitor. If Member's Fees are not enclosed entries will be refused.

3. That grain, seeds, roots, vegetables, horticultural products, plants, flowers, dairy products, agricultural implements, domestic manufactures, ladies' work and fine arts must be on the ground and put in order at 10 a.m. on the first day of the Fair—Thursday, October 4—and to remain until 4 p.m. on the third day.

4. Poultry must be on the grounds and put in order before 12 o'clock (noon) on the first day of the Fair, and remain until the close of the exhibition on Saturday, October 6, at 4 p.m.

5. Admission to the grounds: Thursday—25c, Children Free. Friday and Saturday—50c, Children Half Price. As an inducement, the Fair will sell 3 tickets for \$1.00 before and up to Oct. 1st. See Secretary.

6. All articles of manufacture, including ladies' work, must have been manufactured during the present year.

7. Not less than one bushel of each kind of grain must be shown unless otherwise specified in the Prize List, and the grain and roots must be the growth of 1928 and grown by the competitor except clover seed, which may be the growth of 1927.

8. All produce to be the growth of parties exhibiting the same.

9. No member will be allowed to make more than one entry in each case for Society Prizes with the same animal or article unless otherwise specified. This rule not to apply to animals in herds or pens, nor to special prizes offered by persons outside the Society, but to apply to all kinds of grains, seeds, flour, roots and vegetables, dairy products, domestic manufactures and horticultural products, in which additional specimens would necessarily be similar to the first.

10. None but manufacturers or, their agents must exhibit agricultural machinery.

11. No entries to be removed from the Hall or Root and Vegetable Hall until 4 p.m. of the third day of the Fair.

12. Every animal, fowl, article, product or chattel exhibited must be the actual bona fide property and belong absolutely to the person or persons entering or exhibiting the same. In the case of every article, product or chattel exhibited, other than live stock, the said article, product or chattel must be of the actual production, growth or manufacture, as the case may be, of the person or persons owning or exhibiting the same, except specially mentioned in the list.

13. That no person be allowed to ride or drive horses on the grounds faster than a walk, except when shown or ordered to do so by the Judges, under penalty of immediate removal from the grounds.

14. The exhibitor's name must not be on the bag, etc., in which his produce is exhibited.

15. That no person be allowed to attach any prize or badge obtained at other fairs on any animal or article exhibited until after the judges have made their awards.

16. That all articles entered for competition must be entered in strict accordance with the Prize List in order to secure a prize, the exact number and quantity stated in the Prize List being strictly adhered to.

17. That every bull must have a ring in its nose; horses, colts, cows and calves to be led on the grounds and be secured by the head and pigs and sheep confined in pens, and that owners shall comply with such minor regulations for their safe custody and fair and complete exhibition, as the Committee of Management may suggest.

18. That the exhibitors of horses, cattle and sheep do bring them forward when called upon by the Directors, otherwise they will not be noticed.

19. No competitor will be entitled to a premium if the judges deem the stock or article unworthy of the same.

20. Any person interfering, by conversation or otherwise, with the Judges until after judgment is passed, shall have no prize awarded him.

21. Judges will please sign and hand in their list of awards to the Secretary, and remain until their books have been signed by the Secretary, in order that cases of error or doubt may be more promptly and easily made right, and they are particularly requested not to leave the grounds until they have ascertained from the Secretary that there are no protests against the awards in their department.

22. Any exhibitor or interested person making a protest will be required to make a deposit of \$2, and if said protest is not sustained the said amount will be retained by the Association.

23. All protests to be made in writing as soon as possible, so that the judges in the class may be heard on it, as the Directors of the Society do not constitute a Board of Judges to hear complaints. The Directors earnestly hope that the exhibitors will not enter protests without strong grounds for doing so, as much annoyance and unpleasantness is often occasioned by protests of a frivolous nature.

24. The Society will not be responsible for any loss, damage or accident occurring to any person or property on the grounds during the Fair. The Directors hope patrons of the Fair will obey orders. The Society will take all reasonable care of exhibits, but will not be responsible for any loss or damage.

25. Notice is hereby given that any kind of gambling, theatricals, circus or mountebank performances, exhibitions or shows; also the huckstering or trafficking in spirituous or intoxicating drinks are not allowed within 300 yards of the exhibition grounds, and that 31 Vic., Cap. 29, Clauses 56, 57 and 58, relating thereto, will be enforced if any deviations from the regulations occur.

26. Whilst every possible assistance will be most cheerfully given in placing exhibits, no package or case of any kind whatsoever will be opened unless accompanied by the exhibitor or some one sent specially in charge.

27. Tickets will be placed on the work that has been exhibited before, or is entered in the wrong list, with the words "Ruled Out."

28. Ages of Beef Cattle will be calculated from September 1; Dairy Cattle, August 1.

29. Horses shown in the Carriage and Road Double Classes cannot be shown in the Single Carriage and Road Classes.

ENTRIES.

30. All entries to be made by mail or otherwise before 8 p.m. on Tuesday, October 2nd, 1928, to the Secretary at Caledonia. Parties making entries after that date must pay an additional fee of 50 cents.

31. Exhibitors will find their Entry Cards and Member's Ticket ready for them at the Secretary's office on the first day of the Fair, or will be sent by mail if asked to do so.

PREMIUMS

32. Exhibitors winning Special Prizes will call at 4 p.m. on Saturday, the third day of the Fair, for Special Prize orders. The Treasurer will commence to pay prize money October 16. Checks will be mailed to prize winners for the amount standing to their credit on the Secretary's books.

33. Where the amount of prizes won by the exhibitor is \$5 or over, \$1 will be retained for Membership Fee for 1929.

JUDGES, ETC.

34. Judges for each day will be at the Secretary's Office on the grounds at 12 a.m.

35. Judging will commence at 1 o'clock October 4th and 5th and at 10.30 on October 6th.

36. The members of the different committees will be on the grounds at 9 a.m. each day.

SPECIAL NOTES.

The Hall will be closed at 4 o'clock p.m. on Saturday, and everyone must leave the hall. Tickets will be supplied by the Secretary to all exhibitors for admission, when they can take down their goods in quietness. Tickets for admission to Hall will be found with Entry Tickets, or can be had from the Secretary.

In case an error occurs in the printing of the Prize List, the Directors have the power to rectify the same.

Light Horses to be shown second day, and need be on the grounds at 12 a.m. Exhibitors must bring on horses promptly when called.

Heavy Horses will be shown on the third day at 10.30 a.m. and must be on the ground at 10 a.m.

All Pure Bred colts to be shown in Pure Bred class.

Draught Horses must be 1700 lbs. or over.

Agricultural Horses must be between 1400 and 1700 lbs.

General Purpose Horses must be under 1400 lbs.

Draught Horses to be shown before wagons in farm harness; General Purpose Horses before democrats; Road Horses before ordinary buggies, and colts to halter. Three-year-old Colts may be shown in harness as teams.

In the Pure Bred Class, Mares and Colts may compete for progeny prizes, and not necessarily belong to the exhibitor.

Both Pure Bred and Grades can be shown as teams.

In competing for Championships, Horses and Colts must have already taken first or second prize in their respective classes.

Three-year-old Colts can be shown in the Team Classes after showing in their own class.

No. 9 in "Rules and Regulations" not to apply to horses.

An order from the Secretary will be given the winners to call at the Grafton Store, 16 and 18 James St. N., Hamilton, for their prize.

As the Fairs are mostly open to the World, and as we give prizes to several different Fairs in the district, we feel in justice to all, that any competitor securing a Grafton Special First Prize at any one of the Fairs, will not be entitled to a Grafton Special First Prize, if entering at the others, but may win a second prize. This rule will be strictly adhered to. Any person who has won first prize for two or more seasons will be debarred from entering the same team to compete for the first prize but may compete for the second prize.

Cattle

All exhibitors of pure bred stock must produce certificates if required by the judges. Cattle that have been shown in any other class cannot compete as fat cattle. Three-year-old cows must be giving milk or be evidently in calf.

All animals will be called into the ring for examination after 1 o'clock on the second day of the Fair. Owners or attendants must

be prepared to bring them out when called for or forfeit claims to any premiums. All grade animals must be from pure bred sire.

In case where there is no competition only two prizes will be awarded.
