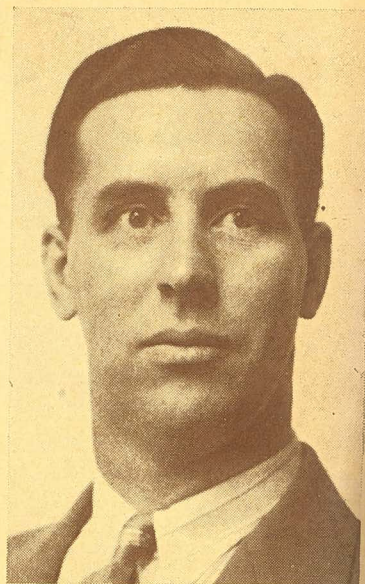
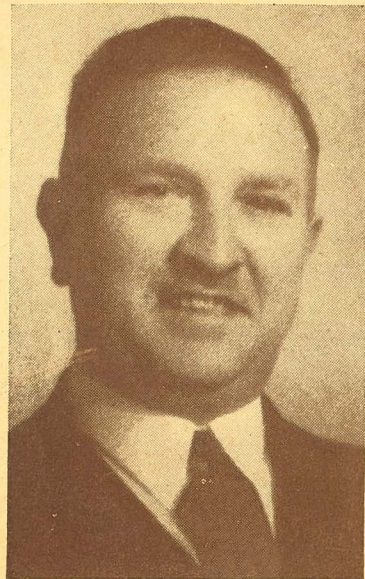

RULES and REGULATIONS

- 1 That competition for the following prizes be open to the world, except when otherwise specified in the Prize List.
- 2 Admission fees: Friday, September 29th, Adults 35c; Children, under 14 years, free; Saturday, Sept. 30th, Adults 50c; Children under 14 years 25c. Cars parked on grounds 50c; Grandstand, Friday, September 29th, 25c; Saturday, Sept. 30th, 50c.
- 3 That annual membership will be \$1.00. Each exhibitor must purchase a members ticket before making entries, a registered firm being recognized as one exhibitor.
- 4 All entries to be made by mail or otherwise before 8 p.m. on Tuesday, September 26, 1950, to the Secretary at Caledonia.
- 5 Exhibitors will find their Entry Cards and Member's Ticket ready for them at the Secretary's Office on the first day of the Fair, or will be sent by mail if asked to do so.
- 6 Where the amount of prizes won by the exhibitor is \$5. or over, \$1.00 will be retained for Membership Fee for 1951.
- 7 That grain, seeds, roots, vegetables, horticultural products, plants, flowers, dairy products, domestic manufactures, ladies' work and fine art must be on the ground and put in order at 10 a.m. on the first day of the Fair—Thursday, September 28th—and to remain until 5 p.m. on the third day.
- 8 Poultry must be on the grounds and put in order before 10 a.m. on the second day of the Fair, and remain until close of the exhibition on Saturday, Sept. 30th at 5 p.m.
- 9 Cattle must not be removed from the cattle barns before 5 p.m. on the day on which they are shown. Any exhibitor who does so shall forfeit his prize money.
- 10 No entries to be removed from the Hall until 5 p.m. on the third day of the Fair.
- 11 The Society will not be responsible for any loss, damage or accident occurring to any person or property on the grounds during the Fair. The Directors hope patrons of the Fair will obey orders. The Society will take all reasonable care of exhibits, but will not be responsible for any loss or damage.
- 12 While every possible assistance will be most cheerfully given in placing exhibits, no package or case of any kind whatsoever will be opened unless accompanied by the exhibitor or some one sent specially in charge.
- 13 That all articles entered for competition must be entered in strict accordance with the Prize List in order to secure a prize, the exact number and quantity stated in the Prize List being strictly adhered to.
- 14 No member will be allowed to make more than one entry in each case for Society Prizes with the same animal or article unless otherwise specified. This rule not to apply to animals in herds or pens, nor to special prizes offered by persons outside the Society, but to apply to all kinds of grains, seeds, flowers, roots and vegetables, dairy products, domestic manu-

- factures and horticultural products, in which additional specimens would necessarily be similar to the first.
- 15 All produce to be growth of parties exhibiting same.
 - 16 Every animal, fowl, article, product or chattel exhibited must be the actual bona fide property and belong absolutely to the person or persons entering or exhibiting the same. In the case of every article, product or chattel exhibited, other than live stock, the said article, product or chattel must be of the actual production, growth or manufacture, as the case may be, of the person or persons owning or exhibiting the same, except specially mentioned in the list.
 - 17 All articles of manufacture including ladies' work, must be modern and all collections of fancy work must be properly mounted.
 - 18 Tickets will be placed on the work that has been exhibited before, or is entered in the wrong list, with the words "Ruled Out."
 - 19 Not less than one bushel of each kind of grain must be shown unless otherwise specified in the Prize List, and the grain and roots must be the growth of 1950 and grown by the competitor except clover seed which may be the growth of 1949.
 - 20 The exhibitor's name must not be on the bag, etc., in which his produce is exhibited.
 - 21 That the exhibitor of horses, cattle and sheep do bring them forward when called upon by the Directors, otherwise they will not be noticed.
 - 22 That no person be allowed to ride or drive horses on the grounds faster than a walk, except when shown or ordered to do so by the Judges, under penalty of immediate removal from the grounds.
 - 23 Ages of Beef Cattle will be calculated from September 1; Dairy Cattle, August 1.
 - 24 Ages of Swine will be calculated from September 1.
 - 25 That no person be allowed to attach any prize or badge obtained at other fairs on any animal or article exhibited until after the judges have made their awards.
 - 26 Judges for each day will be at the Secretary's Office on the grounds at 12 a.m.
 - 27 Judging will commence at 12 o'clock noon September 28th and 1 p.m. on September 29th and 12 o'clock noon on Sept. 30th.
 - 28 The members of the different committees will be on the grounds at 9 a.m. each day.
 - 29 No competitor will be entitled to a premium if the judges deem the stock or article unworthy of the same.
 - 30 Any person interfering by conversation or otherwise, with the Judges until after judgment is passed, shall have no prize awarded him.

- 31 Judges will please sign and hand in their list of awards to the Secretary, and remain until their books have been signed by the Secretary, in order that cases of error or doubt may be more promptly and easily made right, and they are particularly requested not to leave the grounds until they have ascertained from the Secretary that there are no protests against the awards in their department.
- 32 Any exhibitor or interested person making a protest will be required to make a deposit of \$2., and if said protest is not sustained the said amount will be retained by the Association.
- 33 All protests to be made in writing as soon as possible, so that the judges in the class may be heard on it, as the Directors of the Society do not constitute a Board of Judges to hear complaints. The Directors earnestly hope that the exhibitors will not enter protests without strong grounds for doing so, as much annoyance and unpleasantness is often occasioned by protests of frivolous nature.
- 34 Notice is hereby given that any kind of gambling, theatricals, circus or mountebank performances, exhibitions or shows; also huckstering or trafficking of spirituous or intoxicating drinks are not allowed within 300 yards of the exhibition grounds, and that 31 Vic., Cap. 29, Clauses 56, 57 and 58, relating thereto, will be enforced if any deviations from the regulations occur.
- 35 Should rain or some other cause materially cut the gate receipts, Caledonia Agricultural Society reserve the right to pay prize money only to the extent of their cash resources.
- 36 Should it be found impossible to pay prize money in full, winners in “Trials of Speed Classes” shall not be given preference over winners in other Agricultural Classes in the percentage of prize money paid.
- 37 In case an error occurs in the printing of the Prize List, the Directors have the power to rectify the same.

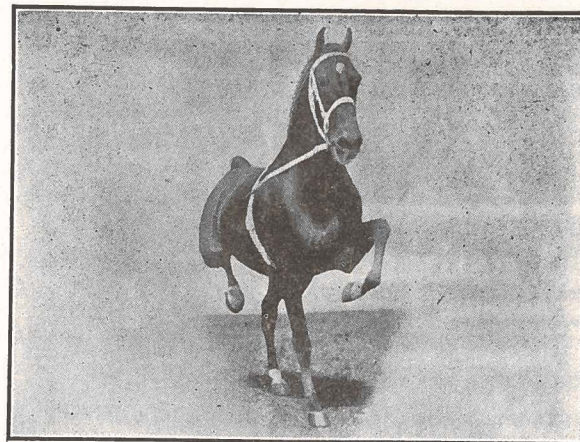

RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. The Ontario Hereford Association, the Ontario Livestock Branch and the Caledonia Fair Board have contributed funds to the amount of \$575.00 for the purpose of staging a Hereford Field Day and Show at the time of the Caledonia Fair.
2. Exhibits will be confined to the Province of Ontario.
3. All cattle must be on the grounds by 11 a.m., Friday, September 29th. Judging will start at 1 p.m. No cattle allowed to leave the grounds before 5 p.m.
4. All entries and entry fees must be made to R. R. Crozier, Department of Agriculture, Cayuga, not later than September 23rd.
5. All animals must be registered in the name of the exhibitor. Registration certificates need not accompany the entries but registration papers must be presented to the checking committee on the morning of the day of showing. Exhibitors are warned when making entries to see that all animals are entered in their correct classes. Exhibitors who fail to present registration certificates to the checking committee shall be barred from showing.
6. Each exhibitor is limited to two entries per class.
7. Exhibitors are allowed to compete at one regional show only.
8. All money not taken on one class will be given to those animals in another class where the entries are greater than the prizes offered.
9. The entry fee will be 50 cents in the individual classes, 50 cents for each group, and no entry fee in the championship classes. Each exhibitor will be required to pay \$1.00 for membership for the year 1950 in the Caledonia Agricultural Society. Entry fees must accompany the entries.
10. The committee shall have power to reduce the prize money from \$5.00 to \$4.00 if a larger entry than the prize list calls for warrants such action.
11. The committee shall have power to refuse the exhibiting of any animal which it deems to be of mediocre quality and therefore unfit for exhibition purposes.
12. General rules for Caledonia Fair shall apply in all cases, including the Health of Animals rules, which in this case are that all animals from herds which are not federally T. B. tested must be stabled separately.
