RULES OF THE SHOW.

1.—The exhibitor must give his name with the kind of stock or article to the Secretary.

2.—All stock and articles for exhibition must be on the ground by ten o'clock a.m., when the Committee will give directions where they shall be placed, and shall not be removed before four o'clock p.m.

3.—All stock on exhibition must be properly looked after by the owners, otherwise no notice will be taken of it by the Judges.

4.—A pedigree of all Cattle in Class 2, together with their ages, shall be produced to the Secretary at time of entry.

5.—Evidence must be adduced, if required, of the Cows and Sows having had stock. Three year old Cows must have raised Calves, if not in the present year they must in the year previous, unless they are evidently with young. Mares must have their foals with them.

6.—Bulls and Boars must be carefully secured to prevent accidents.

7.—The Draught Horses to be shown before a Lumber Waggon.

8.—No animal or article will be allowed to show in more than one class, except when as stated in Prize List.

9.—The stock must be the BONA FIDE property of the exhibitor to entitle him to receive a prize.

10.—The Fruit, Grain, Roots, Seeds and Dairy Products must be the property of the exhibitor, and produced on his farm or holding, and the produce of this year. The means of culture and curing to be given to the Secretary if required.

11.—**IMPLEMENTS AND MANUFACTURES.**—The article must have been manufactured by the exhibitor or his family during the present year. Implements must be manufactured or invented by the exhibitor.

12.—Any person interfering with the Judges by communication or otherwise until after their decision, shall forfeit the prize if awarded him.

13.—Should there be only one competitor, the Judges may use their discretion in awarding a prize or not.

14.—The articles exhibited will only be known to the Judges by their number.

15.—Only one prize will be allowed any exhibitor in each section, except in live stock.

16.—The Managing Committee shall consist of the President, Vice-President, the Directors, and any other person they may appoint.

17.—All subscribers not paying previous to the 1st August, will be charged one dollar and fifty cents to entitle them to become exhibitors.

18.—All entries to be made previous to the day of the Exhibition, if not ten cents extra on each article entered will be charged.

19.—The Treasurer will pay prize money at Dominion Hotel, on Saturday, October 15th, 1887, from 1 until 4 o'clock p.m.

20.—Members will be supplied with two admission tickets—exhibitor's ticket and herdsman's ticket—if required, free on application to the Secretary.

Admission 15 cents. Children under 12, free.

The Secretary will receive entries at his residence, or by letter, Glanford P. O., until Saturday evening, October 8th, and on Saturday, 8th October, will be at Dominion Hotel, Hamilton, from 10 o'clock a.m. until 1 p.m., and at Long's Hotel, Glanford, from 3 o'clock till 5 p.m. Exhibitors are reminded that all entries are to be made previous to the day of Exhibition or they will have to pay 10 cents extra for each article.
