Make Your Entries Early

RULES and REGULATIONS

- 1 That competition for the following prizes be open to the world, except when otherwise specified in the Prize List.
- 2 Admission fees: Friday, September 30th, Adults 35c; Children, under 14 years, free; Saturday, October 1st, Adults 50c; Children under 14 years 25c. Cars parked on grounds 50c; Grandstand, Friday, September 30th, 25c; Saturday, October 1st, 50c.
- 3 That annual membership will be \$1.00. Each exhibitor must purchase a members ticket before making entries, a registered firm being recognized as one exhibitor.
- 4 All entries to be made by mail or otherwise before 8 p.m. on Tuesday, September 27, 1949 to the Secretary at Caledonia.
- 5 Exhibitors will find their Entry Cards and Member's Ticket ready for them at the Secretary's Office on the first day of the Fair, or will be sent by mail if asked to do so.
- 6 Where the amount of prizes won by the exhibitor is \$5. or over, \$1.00 will be retained for Membership Fee for 1950.
- 7 That grain, seeds, roots, vegetables, horticultural products, plants, flowers, dairy products, domestic manufactures, ladies' work and fine art must be on the ground and put in order at 10 a.m. on the first day of the Fair—Thursday, September 29th—and to remain until 5 p.m. on the third day.
- 8 Poultry must be on the grounds and put in order before 10 a.m. on the second day of the Fair, and remain until close of the exhibition on Saturday, October 1st at 5 p.m.
- 9 Cattle must not be removed from the cattle barns before 5 p.m. on the day on which they are shown. Any exhibitor who does so shall forfeit his prize money.
- 10 No entries to be removed from the Hall until 5 p.m. on the third day of the Fair.
- 11 The Hall will be closed at 5 p.m. on Saturday. Tickets will be supplied by the Secretary to all exhibitors for admission, when they can take down their goods. Tickets for admission to Hall will be found with Entry Tickets, or can be had from the Secretary.
- 12 Exhibitors winning Special Prizes will call at 5 p.m. on Saturday, the third day of the Fair, for Special Prize orders. The Treasurer will commence to pay prize money October 8th. Checks will be mailed to prize winners for the amount standing to their credit on the Secretary's books.
- 13 The Society will not be responsible for any loss, damage or accident occurring to any person or property on the grounds during the Fair. The Directors hope patrons of the Fair will obey orders. The Society will take all reasonable care of exhibits, but will not be responsible for any loss or damage.
- 14 While every possible assistance will be most cheerfully given in placing exhibits, no package or case of any kind whatsoever will be opened unless accompanied by the exhibitor or some one sent specially in charge.
- 15 That all articles entered for competition must be entered in strict accordance with the Prize List in order to secure a prize,

- the exact number and quantity stated in the Prize List being strictly adhered to.
- 16 No member will be allowed to make more than one entry in each case for Society Prizes with the same animal or article unless otherwise specified. This rule not to apply to animals in herds or pens, nor to special prizes offered by persons outside the Society, but to apply to all kinds of grains, seeds flowers, roots and vegetables, dairy products, domestic manufactures and horticultural products, in which additional specimens would necessarily be similar to the first.
 - 17 All produce to be growth of parties exhibiting same.
 - 18 Every animal, fowl, article, product or chattel exhibited must be the actual bona fide property and belong absolutely to the person or persons entering or exhibiting the same. In the case of every article, product or chattel exhibited, other than live stock, the said article, product or chattel must be of the actual production, growth or manufacture, as the case may be, of the person or persons owning or exhibiting the same, except specially mentioned in the list.
 - 19 All articles of manufacture including ladies' work, must be modern and all collections of fancy work must be properly mounted.
 - 20 Tickets will be placed on the work that has been exhibited before, or is entered in the wrong list, with the words "Ruled Out."
 - 21 Not less than one bushel of each kind of grain must be shown unless otherwise specified in the Prize List, and the grain and roots must be the growth of 1949 and grown by the competitor except clover seed which may be the growth of 1948
 - 22 The exhibitor's name must not be on the bag, etc., in which his produce is exhibited.
 - 23 That every bull must have a ring in his nose, horses, colts, cows and calves to be led on the grounds and be secured by the head and pigs and sheep confined in pens, and that owners shall comply with such minor regulations for their safe custody and fair and complete exhibition, as the Committee of Management may suggest.
 - 24 That the exhibitor of horses, cattle and sheep do bring them forward when called upon by the Directors, otherwise they will not be noticed.
 - 25 That no person be allowed to ride or drive horses on the grounds faster than a walk, except when shown or ordered to do so by the Judges, under penalty of immediate removal from the grounds.
 - 26 Ages of Beef Cattle will be calculated from September 1; Dairy Cattle, August 1.
 - 27 Ages of Swine will be calculated from September 1.
 - 28 In the Sheep and Cattle Classes where there is no competition, only 1st and 2nd prizes will be paid.
 - 29 That no person be allowed to attach any prize or badge obtained at other fairs on any animal or article exhibited until after the judges have made their awards.

- 30 Judges for each day will be at the Secretary's Office on the grounds at 12 a.m.
- 31 Judging will commence at 12 o'clock noon. September 29th and 1 p.m. on September 30th and 12 o'clock noon on October 1st.
- 32 The members of the different committees will be on the grounds at 9 a.m. each day.
- 33 No competitor will be entitled to a premium if the judges deem the stock or article unworthy of the same.
- 34 Any person interfering by conversation or otherwise, with the Judges until after judgment is passed, shall have no prize awarded him.
- 35 Judges will please sign and hand in their list of awards to the Secretary, and remain until their books have been signed by the Secretary, in order that cases of error or doubt may be more promptly and easily made right, and they are particularly requested not to leave the grounds until they have ascertained from the Secretary that there are no protests against the awards in their department.
- 36 Any exhibitor or interested person making a protest will be required to make a deposit of \$2., and if said protest is not sustained the said amount will be retained by the Association.
- 37 All protests to be made in writing as soon as possible, so that the judges in the class may be heard on it, as the Directors of the Society do not constitute a Board of Judges to hear complaints. The Directors earnestly hope that the exhibitors will not enter protests without strong grounds for doing so, as much annoyance and unpleasantness is often occasioned by protests of frivolous nature.
- 38 Notice is hereby given that any kind of gambling, theatricals, circus or mountebank performances, exhibitions or shows; also huckstering or trafficking of spirituous or intoxicating drinks are not allowed within 300 yards of the exhibition grounds, and that 31 Vic., Cap. 29, Clauses 56, 57 and 58, relating thereto. will be enforced if any deviations from the regulations occur.
- 39 Should rain or some other cause materially cut the gate receipts, Caledonia Agricultural Society reserve the right to pay prize money only to the extent of their cash resources.
- 40 In case an error occurs in the printing of the Prize List, the Directors have the power to rectify the same.

REGULATIONS RE TRIALS OF SPEED

- 1 Each event will have three heats and each heat will be a race.
- 2 Not more than a 50% payment on prizes awarded for trials of speed shall be made, before all prize winners in Agricultural Classes shall have received at least 50% payment on prize accounts.
- 3 Should it be found impossible to pay prize money in full, winners in "Trials of Speed Classes" shall not be given preference over winners in other Agricultural Classes in the percentage of prize money paid.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. The competitive classes are open to bonafide farmers living in the counties of Brant, Haldimand, Lincoln, Norfolk, Welland and Wentworth.
2. Entries should be made on the prescribed form in duplicate and one copy must be sent to the Department of Agriculture, Cayuga, on or before September 1st, 1949, in the case of market poultry and September 15th in the case of eggs. Entry forms can be secured from Reg. M. Hudspeth, Secretary, Caledonia Agricultural Society, or the Department of Agriculture, Cayuga.
3. Each entry in the dressed poultry classes shall consist of twelve (12) birds which shall have been carefully selected and fed by the exhibitor to produce the highest possible quality exhibit.
4. The twelve birds so selected must be processed and properly packed in a commercial box of the proper size to make up the final exhibit.
5. There is no limit to the number of entries that may be received from any one county but not more than one entry will be accepted from any one farm.
6. Birds which do not make Milk-Fed A's will be automatically disqualified.
7. Exhibits in both classes must be delivered to the Exhibit Hall at the Caledonia Fall Fair by 10.00 o'clock A.M. on Friday morning, September 30th, 1949.
8. Each exhibit in the egg class will consist of fifteen (15) dozen packed in Keyes trays.
9. The Committee in charge reserves the right to limit the number of entries of either eggs or poultry on display in keeping with the spaces available.
10. The Committee in charge shall have power to make such other rules and regulations as are deemed advisable.
11. The committee shall have power to reallocate the prize money offered if it is deemed necessary and advisable.

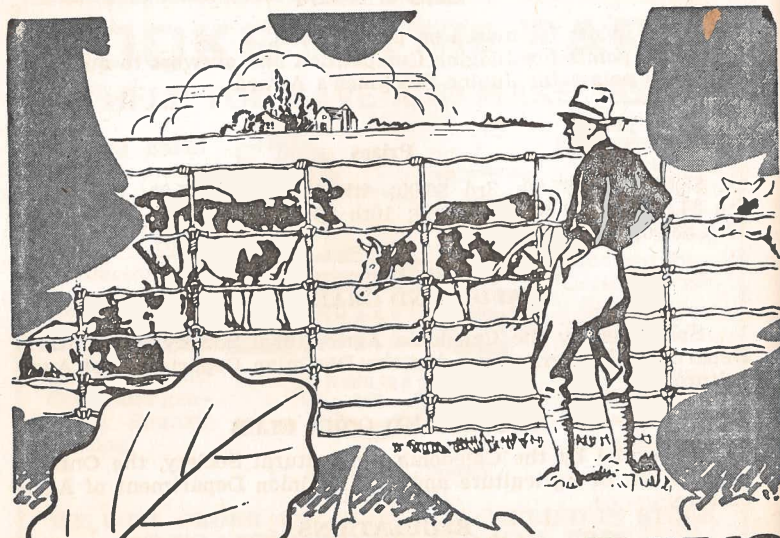

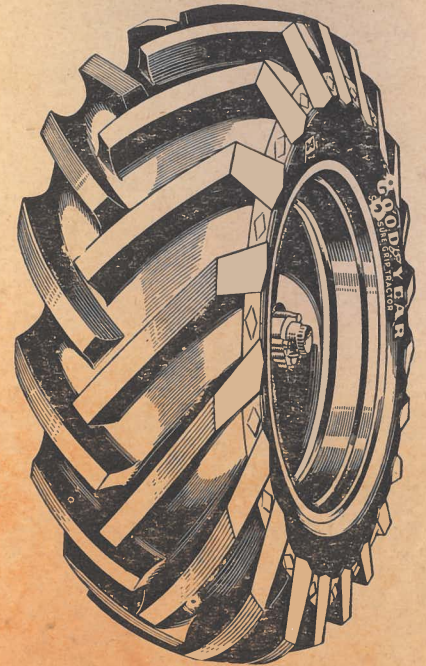
