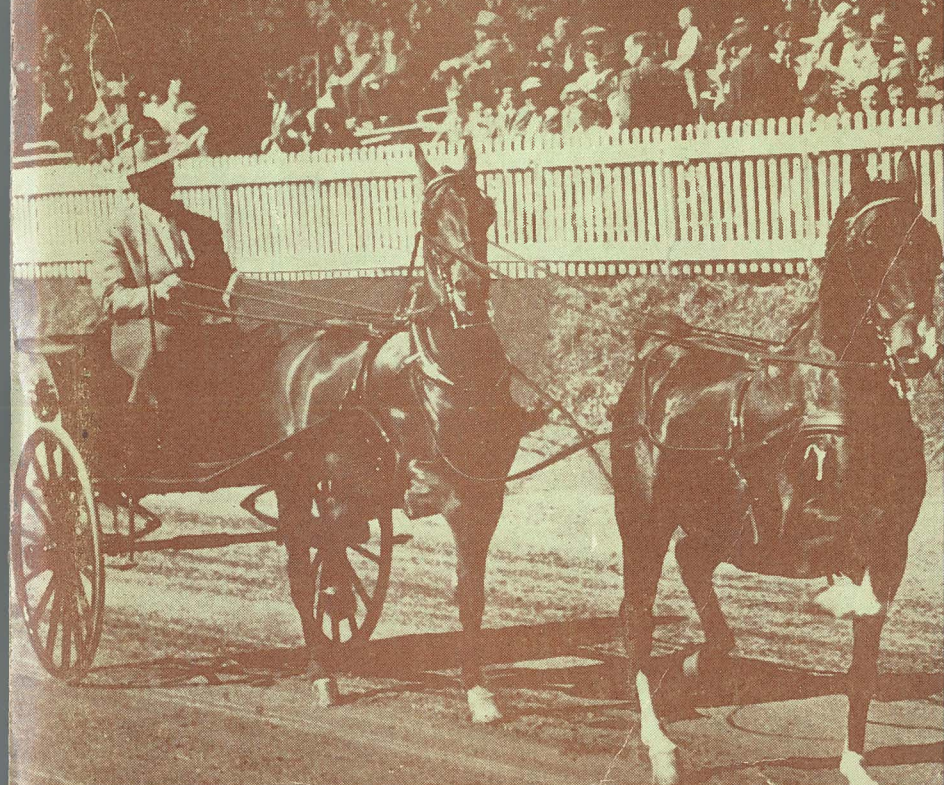

RULES and REGULATIONS

1. That competition for the following prizes be open to the world, except when otherwise specified in the Prize List.
2. Admission fees: Friday, September 28th, Adults 50c; High School Students 25c; Public School and under free; Saturday, September 29th, Adults 50c; Children under 14 years 25c. Cars parked on grounds 50c. Grandstand, Friday afternoon, September 28th, Adults 50c; High School Students 25c; Public School and under free. Saturday afternoon, September 29th, Adults 50c; Children between the age of 6 and 14 years, 25c. Gate admission after 6.00 p.m. Thursday, September 27th is 25 cents, however, night admission on Friday, September 28th and Saturday, September 29th will be 50 cents for Adults and 25 cents for children.

There will be a positively free Grandstand Show on both Friday night, September 28th and Saturday night, September 29th.

3. That annual membership will be \$1.00. Each exhibitor must purchase a member's ticket before making entries, a registered firm being recognized as one exhibitor.
4. All entries to be made by mail or otherwise before 8 p.m. on Monday, September 24th, 1956 to the Secretary at Caledonia.
5. Exhibitors will find their Entry Cards and Member's ticket ready for them at the Secretary's Office on the first day of the Fair, or will be sent by mail if asked to do so.
6. Where the amount of prizes won by the exhibitor is \$5.00 or over, \$1.00 will be retained for Membership Fee for 1957. Where the amount of prize money, won by an Exhibitor, is less than \$2.00 there will be no deductions in lieu of entry fees.
7. That grain, seeds, roots, vegetables, horticultural products, plants, flowers, dairy products, domestic manufacturers, ladies' work and fine art must be on the ground and put in order by 12.00 noon on the first day of the Fair—Thursday, September 27th—and to remain until 6 p.m. on the third day.
8. Poultry must be on the ground and put in order by 9.00 a.m. on the second day of the Fair, and remain until close of the exhibition on Saturday, September 29th at 5 p.m.
9. Cattle must not be removed from the cattle barns before 5.00 p.m. on the day on which they are shown. Any exhibitor who does so shall forfeit his prize money.
10. **No entries to be removed from the Hall until 6 p.m. on the third day of the Fair.**
11. The Society will not be responsible for any loss, damage or accident occurring to any person or property on the grounds during the Fair. The Directors hope patrons of the Fair will obey orders. The Society will take all reasonable care of exhibits, but will not be responsible for any loss or damage.

12. While every possible assistance will be most cheerfully given in placing exhibits no package or case of any kind whatsoever will be opened unless accompanied by the exhibitor or someone sent specially in charge.
13. That all articles entered for competition must be entered in strict accordance with the Prize List in order to secure a prize, the exact number and quantity stated in the Prize List being strictly adhered to.
14. No member will be allowed to make more than one entry in each case for Society Prizes with the same animal or article unless otherwise specified. This rule not to apply to animals in herds or pens, nor to special prizes offered by persons outside the Society, but to apply to all kinds of grains, seeds, flowers roots and vegetables, dairy products, domestic manufacturers and horticultural products, in which additional specimens would necessarily be similar to the first.
15. All produce to be growth of parties exhibiting same.
16. Every animal, fowl, article, product or chattel exhibited must be the actual bona fide property and belong absolutely to the person or persons entering or exhibiting the same. In the case of every article, product or chattel exhibited, other than live stock, the said article, product or chattel must be of the actual production, growth or manufacture, as the case may be, of the person or persons owning or exhibiting the same, except specially mentioned in the list.
17. All articles of manufacture including ladies' work must be modern and all collections of fancy work must be properly mounted.
18. Tickets will be placed on the work that has been exhibited before, or is entered in the wrong list, with the words "Ruled Out."
19. Not less than one bushel of each kind of grain must be shown unless otherwise specified in the Prize List, and the grain and roots must be the growth of 1956 and grown by the competitor except clover seed which may be the growth of 1955.
20. The exhibitor's name must not be on the bag, etc. in which his produce is exhibited.
21. That the exhibitor of horses, cattle and sheep do bring them forward when called upon by the Directors, otherwise they will not be noticed.
22. That no person be allowed to ride or drive horses on the grounds faster than a walk, except when shown or ordered to do so by the Judges, under penalty of immediate removal from the grounds.
23. Ages of Beef Cattle will be calculated from September 1st, Dairy Cattle, July 1st.
24. Ages of Swine will be calculated from September 1st.
25. That no person be allowed to attach any prize or badge obtained at other fairs on any animal or article exhibited until after the judges have made their awards.

26. Judges for each day will be at the Secretary's Office on the grounds at 12 a.m. unless otherwise notified.
27. Judging will commence at 1.00 o'clock sharp, September 27th and 12 o'clock noon on September 28th and 12 o'clock noon on September 29th unless otherwise specified in the Prize List.
28. The members of the different committees will be on the grounds at 9 a.m. each day.
29. No competitor will be entitled to a premium if the judges deem the stock or article unworthy of the same.
30. Any person interfering by conservation or otherwise, with the Judges until after judgment is passed, shall have no prize awarded him.
31. Judges will please sign and hand in their list of awards to the Secretary, and remain until their books have been signed by the Secretary, in order that cases of error or doubt may be more promptly and easily made right, and they are particularly requested not to leave the grounds until they have ascertained from the Secretary that there are no protests against the awards in their department.
32. Any exhibitor making a protest will be required to make a deposit of \$2.00, and if said protest is not sustained the said amount will be retained by the Association.
33. All protests to be made in writing as soon as possible, so that the judges in the class may be heard on it, as the Directors of the Society do not constitute a Board of Judges to hear complaints. The Directors earnestly hope that the exhibitors will not enter protests without strong grounds for doing so, as much annoyance and unpleasantness is often occasioned by protests of frivolous nature.
34. Notice is hereby given that any kind of gambling or mountebank performances, also huckstering or trafficking of spirituous or intoxicating drinks are not allowed on the grounds or within 300 yards of the exhibition grounds, and that 31 Vic., Cap. 29, Clauses 56, 57 and 58, relating thereto, will be enforced if any deviations from the regulations occur.
35. The sale of lottery tickets will not be allowed on the Caledonia Fair grounds or within 300 yards of the grounds unless sponsored by the Caledonia Agricultural Society.
36. Should rain or some other cause materially cut the gate receipts, Caledonia Agricultural Society reserve the right to pay prize money only to the extent of their cash resources.
37. Should it be found impossible to pay prize money in full, winners in "Trials of Speed Classes" shall not be given preference over winners in other Agricultural Classes in the percentage of prize money paid.
38. In case an error occurs in the printing of the Prize List, the Directors have the power to rectify the same.

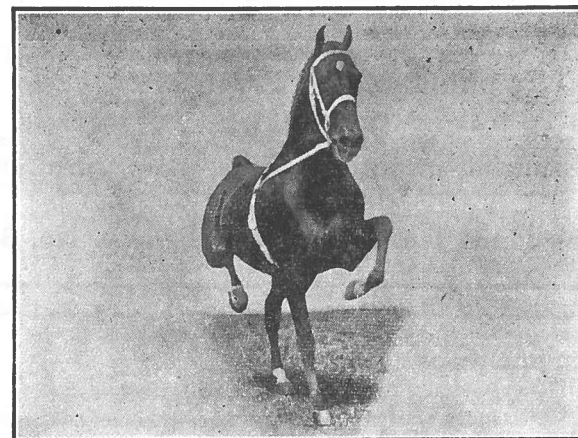

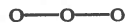

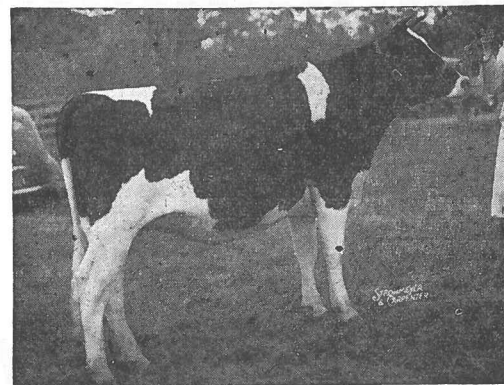

RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. The Ontario Hereford Association, the Ontario Live Stock Branch and the Caledonia Fair Board have contributed funds to the amount of \$858.00 for the purpose of staging a Hereford Field Day and Show at the time of the Caledonia Fair.
2. Exhibits will be confined to the Province of Ontario.
3. All cattle must be on the grounds by 10.00 a.m., September 28th. Judging will start at 12.30 p.m. No cattle allowed to leave the grounds before 5.00 p.m.
4. **All entries and entry fees (50c) must be made out and mailed to Reg. M. Hudspeth, Secretary, Caledonia Agricultural Society, Caledonia, not later than September 21st, 1956.**
5. All animals must be registered in the name of the Exhibitor. Registration certificates need not accompany the entries but registration papers must be presented to the checking committee on the morning of the day of the showing. Exhibitors are warned when making entries to see that all animals are entered in their correct classes. Exhibitors who fail to present registration certificates to the checking committee shall be barred from showing.
6. **Each exhibitor is limited to two entries per class, except in the Group Classes which will be limited to one entry from each exhibitor.**
7. Exhibitors are allowed to compete at one regional show only. Exhibitors at Erin Championship Show must have shown their cattle at a Regional Fair.
8. The entry fee will be fifty cents in individual classes, 50 cents for each group, and no entry fee in the Championship Classes. Each exhibitor will be required to pay \$1.00 for membership for the year 1956 in the Caledonia Agricultural Society. Entry fees must accompany entries.
9. The committee shall have the power to reduce the prize money from \$6.00 to \$5.00 if a larger entry than the prize list calls for, warrants such action.
10. The committee shall have the power to refuse the exhibiting of any animal which it deems to be of mediocre quality and therefore unfit for exhibition purposes.
11. All general rules of Caledonia Agricultural Society except as especially provided shall apply.

HEALTH OF ANIMALS

1. All cattle exhibited at Hereford Regional Shows, excepting those from Accredited Herds or from a T.B. Tested area, must have passed a satisfactory tuberculin test, conducted by the Health of Animals Branch, within 60 days prior to the Fair.
2. (a) Cattle will be required to be negative to the Blood Test within 60 days of the date of the Fair, excepting listed herds and herds under Federal Supervision.
(b) All cattle must be accompanied by Health Certificates. This rule will be enforced.
(c) Vaccinated animals, up to 30 months of age, will be accepted without blood test, provided that a vaccination certificate, signed by a registered Veterinary, is produced by the owner showing that the animal has been vaccinated at the proper age.
(d) Calves entered in the Calf Club contest do not require certificates of T.B. and Blood Test, but must be kept in separate quarters provided by the Fair.
3. Registration Certificates must accompany each animal for checking as it enters the ring, excepting in the case of Regional or Championship Shows where entries are made to officers of the Association.

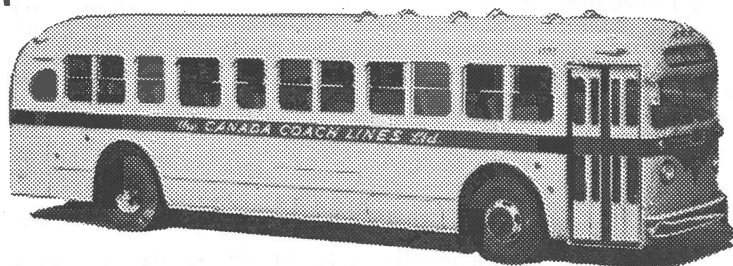

GENERAL RULES FOR ALL BREEDS

All animals must be from fully accredited herds, or from herds under accreditation, or must have passed a clean test within 60 days prior to the date of the show.

All animals exhibited must be negative to a Federal or Guelph blood test within 60 days of the Show or be from listed herds.

Cattle up to 30 months of age are eligible to show regardless of their blood status, provided they have been vaccinated, and an official certificate of vaccination has been issued, showing that this was done before the animal had reached 9 months of age.

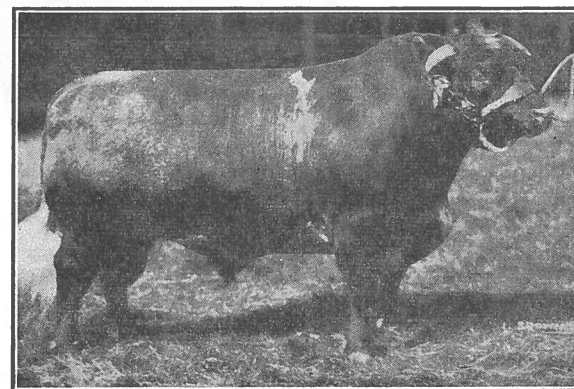
Exhibitors are allowed two entries in each single section and one entry only in the group sections.

Cattle must be in the barns by 10.00 a.m. on the day that class is shown and must remain on the grounds until after the Parade.

Judging will commence at 12.30 o'clock.

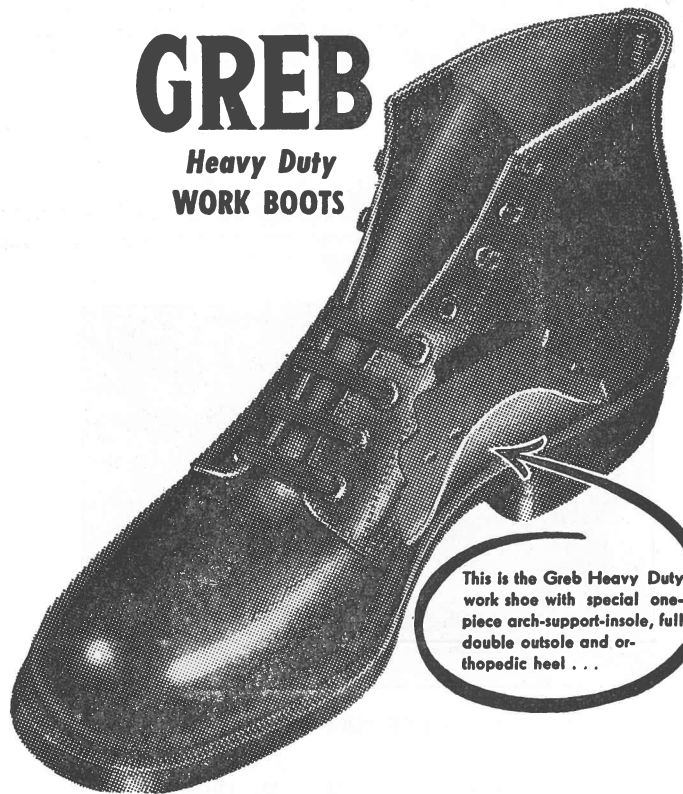

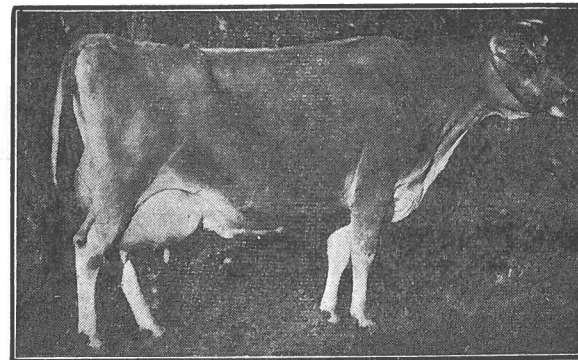

Exhibitors must be prepared to present registration certificates, if requested, on the day of showing. Any exhibitor who fails to do so shall be debarred.
6. Exhibitors will not be permitted to make more than two entries in classes for single animals and more than one entry in flock classes.
7. Any money not taken up in one section or class may be transferred to animals in another section or class, where entries are greater than the number of prizes offered. The committee shall exercise jurisdiction over the transfer of prize money.
8. The entry fee shall be 25c for each entry and will be deducted from the prize money. Each exhibitor will be required to pay 1956 membership in the Caledonia Agricultural Society.
9. General Rules of the Caledonia Fair will apply in all cases.

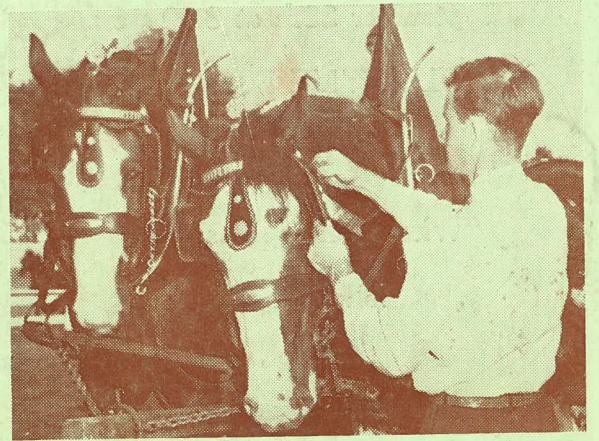
