RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. That competition for the following prizes be open to the world, except when otherwise specified in the prize list.—
2. The annual membership fee if paid on or before Tuesday, Oct. 8th, 1907, will be \$1.00; after that date \$1.50 will be charged. Each exhibitor must purchase a member's ticket before making entries, a registered firm being recognized as one exhibitor. If member's fees is not enclosed entries will be refused. Members making additional entries the day of the fair will be charged a fee of 10c for each entry.
3. Each member will be supplied with two admission tickets and a member's ticket. Herdsmen's tickets will be given at the gate by the gate-keeper.
4. That grain, seeds, roots, vegetables, horticultural products, plants, flowers, dairy products, agricultural implements, domestic manufacturers, ladies' work and fine arts, be on the ground and put in order at 10 a. m. on the first day of the fair, Thursday, Oct. 10, and to remain until 4.30 p. m. on the second day.
5. Gattle, sheep, pigs, poultry must be on the grounds and put in order before 10 a.m. on the first day of the fair and remain until the close of the exhibition on Friday, Oct. 11 at 4.30 p.m.
6. Admission to the grounds 25c each time, children under 12 years 10c.
7. All buggy horses not intended for exhibition, driving on the grounds will be charged 25c., teams 50c., and each person in vehicle 25c.; admission to Grand Stand 10c.
8. All articles of manufacture, including ladies' work, shall have been manufactured during the present year.
9. Not less than one bushel of each kind of grain must be shown, unless otherwise specified in prize list, and the grain and roots must be the growth of 1907 and grown by the competitor, except clover seed which may be the growth of 1906.
10. All produce to be the growth of parties exhibiting the same.
11. No member allowed to make more than one entry in each class for Society's prizes with the same animal or article. This rule not to apply to animals in herds and pens, nor to special prizes offered by persons outside the Society, but to apply to all kinds of grain, seeds, flour, roots and vegetables, dairy products, domestic manufactures and horticultural products, in which additional specimens would necessarily be similar to the first.
12. None but manufacturers or their agents must exhibit agricultural implements.
13. No articles to be removed from the drill hall or root and vegetable hall until after 4.30 p. m. on the second day of the fair.

14. Every animal, fowl, article, product or chattel exhibited must be the actual bona fide property and belong absolutely to the person or persons entering or exhibiting the same. In the case of every article, product or chattel exhibited, other than live stock, the said article, product or chattel must be of the actual production, growth or manufacture, as the case may be, of the person or persons owning and exhibiting the same.
15. Numbers of horses having heretofore been entered merely for the purpose of driving about the grounds, the committee on horses have decided to charge 25c for single rigs and 50c for double; the money to be returned to all that exhibit.
16. That no person be allowed to ride or drive horses on the grounds faster than a walk, except when shown and ordered to do so by the judges, under penalty of immediate removal from the grounds.
17. The exhibitor's name must not be on the bag, etc., in which his produce is exhibited.
18. That no person be allowed to attach any prize ticket or badge obtained at other fairs on any animal or article exhibited until after the judges have made their awards.
19. That all the articles entered for competition must be entered in strict accordance with the prize list in order to secure a prize, the exact number or quality stated in the prize list being strictly adhered to.
20. That every bull must have a ring in its nose; horses, colts, cows and calves be led on the grounds and be secured by the head; and pigs and sheep confined in pens; and that owners shall comply with such minor regulations for their safe custody and fair and complete exhibition as the Committee of Management may suggest.
21. That the exhibitors of cattle, horses and sheep do bring them forward when called upon by the judges, otherwise they will not be noticed by the judges.
22. No competitor will be entitled to a premium if the judges deem the stock or article unworthy of the same.
23. Any person interfering, by conversation or otherwise with the judges until after judgment is passed, shall have no prize awarded him.
24. Judges will please sign and hand in their list of awards to the Secretary, and remain until their books have been signed by the Secretary, in order that cases of error or doubt may be more promptly and easily made right, and they are particularly requested not to leave the grounds until they have ascertained from the Secretary that there are no protests against the awards in the classes they have judged.
25. Any exhibitor or interested person making a protest will be required to make a deposit of \$2, and if said protest is not sustained the said amount will be retained by the Association.

26. All protests to be made in writing as soon as possible, so that the judges in the class may be heard on it, as the directors of the Agricultural Society do not constitute a board of judges to hear complaints and receive appeals. The directors earnestly hope that the exhibitors will not enter protests without strong grounds for doing so, as much annoyance and unpleasantness is often occasioned by protests of a frivolous nature.

27. This society will not be responsible for any loss, damage or accident occurring to any person or property on the ground during the fair. Men will be in charge of track to prevent people from crossing during speed contests. The directors hope patrons of the fair will obey orders. The Society will take all reasonable care of exhibits but will not be responsible for any loss or damage.

28. Notice is hereby given that any kind of gambling, theatricals, circus or mountebank performances, exhibitions or shows, also the huckstering or trafficking in spirituous or intoxicating drinks are not allowed within 300 yards of the exhibition grounds, and that 31 Vic., Chap. 29, clauses 56, 57 and 58 relating thereto, will be enforced if any deviations from the regulations occur.

29. In order to stop the growing practice of sending exhibits in care of the Superintendent of the Department, the following order will be invariably adhered to; whilst every possible assistance will be most cheerfully given in placing exhibits, no package or case of any kind whatsoever will be opened unless accompanied by the exhibitor or some one sent specially in charge.

30. Tickets will be placed on the work that has been exhibited before or is entered in the wrong class, with the words "Ruled Out."

31. PARADE (without fail). There will be a grand parade of prize winning horses and cattle in front of the grand stand at 3.30 o'clock, Friday, Oct. 11th, under the charge of Messrs. James Douglas and I. Weylie. Animals not shown in this parade will not receive prize money.

ENTRIES

32. All entries to be made by mail or otherwise before 8 p.m., on Tuesday, Oct. 8th, 1907, to the Secretary at Caledonia. Parties making entries after that date must pay an additional fee of 50c.

33. Exhibitors will find their entry cards and member's ticket ready for them at the Secretary's office on the first day of the fair or will be sent by mail if asked to do so.

PREMIUMS

34. Exhibitors winning special prizes will call at 4.30 p.m. on Friday, the second day of the fair for special prize orders. The Treasurer will be at the Secretary's office to pay prize money on Friday and Saturday, Oct. 25th and 26th. After this date cheques will be mailed to prize winners for the amount standing to their credit on the Secretary's books.

35. Where the amount of prizes won by an exhibitor is \$5 or over, \$1 will be retained for membership fee for 1907.

JUDGES, ETC.

36. Judges for each day will be at the Secretary's office on the grounds at 11 a.m.

37. Judging will commence at 12 o'clock each day.

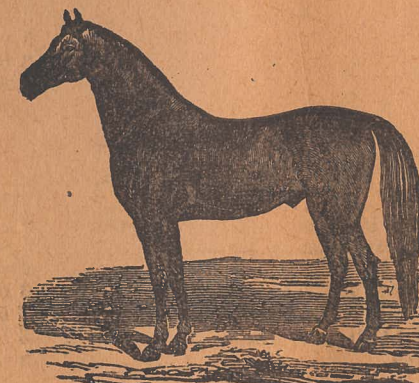
38. A luncheon will be prepared on the grounds for the judges at 11 o'clock each day.

39. The members of the different committees will be on the ground at 9 a.m. each day.

SPECIAL NOTES

The Drill Hall will be closed at 4.30 o'clock on Friday, and everyone must leave the hall. Tickets will be supplied by the Secretary to all exhibitors for admission, when they can take down their goods in quietness. Tickets given with entry tickets.

HORSES.

Horses to be shown second day, and must be on the grounds at 10 a.m. Exhibitors must bring on horses promptly when called.

Draught horses to be shown before lumber wagon in farm harness, general purpose horses before democrats, carriage and road horses before ordinary buggies, and colts to halter.

All prize winners of horses must take part in the parade at 3.30 p.m. on the last day of the Exhibition. Exhibitors or their employees not complying with this rule shall forfeit all prizes awarded them.
