**RULES and REGULATIONS**

- 1 That competition for the following prizes be open to the world, except when otherwise specified in the Prize List.
- 2 Admission fees: Friday, October 1st, Adults 35c; Children, under 14 years, free; Saturday, October 2nd, Adults 50c; Children under 14 years 25c. Cars parked on grounds 50c; Grandstand, Friday, October 1st, 25c.; Saturday, October 2nd, 35c.
- 3 That annual membership will be \$1.00. Each exhibitor must purchase a members ticket before making entries, a registered firm being recognized as one exhibitor. If Member's Fees are not enclosed entries will be refused.
- 4 All entries to be made by mail or otherwise before 8 p.m. on Tuesday, September 28, 1948 to the Secretary at Caledonia.
- 5 Exhibitors will find their Entry Cards and Member's Ticket ready for them at the Secretary's Office on the first day of the Fair, or will be sent by mail if asked to do so.
- 6 Where the amount of prizes won by the exhibitor is \$5. or over, \$1.00 will be retained for Membership Fee for 1949.
- 7 That grain, seeds, roots, vegetables, horticultural products, plants, flowers, dairy products, domestic manufactures, ladies' work and fine art must be on the ground and put in order at 10 a.m. on the first day of the Fair—Thursday, September 30th—and to remain until 5 p.m. on the third day.
- 8 Poultry must be on the grounds and put in order before 10. a.m. on the second day of the Fair, and remain until close of the exhibition on Saturday, October 2nd at 5 p.m.
- 9 Cattle must not be removed from the cattle barns before 5 p.m. on the day on which they are shown. Any exhibitor who does so shall forfeit his prize money.
- 10 No entries to be removed from the Hall until 5 p.m. on the third day of the Fair.
- 11 The Hall will be closed at 5 p.m. on Saturday. Tickets will be supplied by the Secretary to all exhibitors for admission, when they can take down their goods. Tickets for admission to Hall will be found with Entry Tickets, or can be had from the Secretary.
- 12 Exhibitors winning Special Prizes will call at 5 p.m. on Saturday, the third day of the Fair, for Special Prize orders. The Treasurer will commence to pay prize money October 9th. Checks will be mailed to prize winners for the amount standing to their credit on the Secretary's books.
- 13 The Society will not be responsible for any loss, damage or accident occurring to any person or property on the grounds during the Fair. The Directors hope patrons of the Fair will obey orders. The Society will take all reasonable care of exhibits, but will not be responsible for any loss or damage.
- 14 While every possible assistance will be most cheerfully given in placing exhibits, no package or case of any kind whatsoever will be opened unless accompanied by the exhibitor or some one sent specially in charge.
- 15 That all articles entered for competition must be entered in strict accordance with the Prize List in order to secure a prize,

- the exact number and quantity stated in the Prize List being strictly adhered to.
- 16 No member will be allowed to make more than one entry in each case for Society Prizes with the same animal or article unless otherwise specified. This rule not to apply to animals in herds or pens, nor to special prizes offered by persons outside the Society, but to apply to all kinds of grains, seeds flowers, roots and vegetables, dairy products, domestic manufactures and horticultural products, in which additional specimens would necessarily be similar to the first.
  - 17 All produce to be growth of parties exhibiting same.
  - 18 Every animal, fowl, article, product or chattel exhibited must be the actual bona fide property and belong absolutely to the person or persons entering or exhibiting the same. In the case of every article, product or chattel exhibited, other than live stock, the said article, product or chattel must be of the actual production, growth or manufacture, as the case may be, of the person or persons owning or exhibiting the same, except specially mentioned in the list.
  - 19 All articles of manufacture including ladies' work, must be modern and all collections of fancy work must be properly mounted.
  - 20 Tickets will be placed on the work that has been exhibited before, or is entered in the wrong list, with the words "Ruled Out."
  - 21 Not less than one bushel of each kind of grain must be shown unless otherwise specified in the Prize List, and the grain and roots must be the growth of 1948 and grown by the competitor except clover seed which may be the growth of 1947
  - 22 The exhibitor's name must not be on the bag, etc., in which his produce is exhibited.
  - 23 That every bull must have a ring in his nose, horses, colts, cows and calves to be led on the grounds and be secured by the head and pigs and sheep confined in pens, and that owners shall comply with such minor regulations for their safe custody and fair and complete exhibition, as the Committee of Management may suggest.
  - 24 That the exhibitor of horses, cattle and sheep do bring them forward when called upon by the Directors, otherwise they will not be noticed.
  - 25 That no person be allowed to ride or drive horses on the grounds faster than a walk, except when shown or ordered to do so by the Judges, under penalty of immediate removal from the grounds.
  - 26 Ages of Beef Cattle will be calculated from September 1; Dairy Cattle, August 1.
  - 27 Ages of Swine will be calculated from September 1.
  - 28 In the Sheep and Cattle Classes where there is no competition, only 1st and 2nd prizes will be paid.
  - 29 That no person be allowed to attach any prize or badge obtained at other fairs on any animal or article exhibited until after the judges have made their awards.

- 30 Judges for each day will be at the Secretary's Office on the grounds at 12 a.m.
- 31 Judging will commence at 12 o'clock noon, September 30th, and 1 p.m. on October 1st, and 12 o'clock noon on October 2nd.
- 32 The members of the different committees will be on the grounds at 9 a.m. each day.
- 33 No competitor will be entitled to a premium if the judges deem the stock or article unworthy of the same.
- 34 Any person interfering by conversation or otherwise, with the Judges until after judgment is passed, shall have no prize awarded him.
- 35 Judges will please sign and hand in their list of awards to the Secretary, and remain until their books have been signed by the Secretary, in order that cases of error or doubt may be more promptly and easily made right, and they are particularly requested not to leave the grounds until they have ascertained from the Secretary that there are no protests against the awards in their department.
- 36 Any exhibitor or interested person making a protest will be required to make a deposit of \$2., and if said protest is not sustained the said amount will be retained by the Association.
- 37 All protests to be made in writing as soon as possible, so that the judges in the class may be heard on it, as the Directors of the Society do not constitute a Board of Judges to hear complaints. The Directors earnestly hope that the exhibitors will not enter protests without strong grounds for doing so, as much annoyance and unpleasantness is often occasioned by protests of frivolous nature.
- 38 Notice is hereby given that any kind of gambling, theatricals, circus or mountebank performances, exhibitions or shows; also huckstering or trafficking of spirituous or intoxicating drinks are not allowed within 300 yards of the exhibition grounds, and that 31 Vic., Cap. 29, Clauses 56, 57 and 58, relating thereto, will be enforced if any deviations from the regulations occur.
- 39 Should rain or some other cause materially cut the gate receipts, Caledonia Agricultural Society reserve the right to pay prize money only to the extent of their cash resources.
- 40 In case an error occurs in the printing of the Prize List, the Directors have the power to rectify the same.

#### REGULATIONS RE TRIALS OF SPEED

- 1 Each event will have three heats and each heat will be a race.
- 2 Not more than a 50% payment on prizes awarded for trials of speed shall be made, before all prize winners in Agricultural Classes shall have received at least 50% payment on prize accounts.
- 3 Should it be found impossible to pay prize money in full, winners in "Trials of Speed Classes" shall not be given preference over winners in other Agricultural Classes in the percentage of prize money paid.

### ONE DAY PIG SHOW, FRIDAY, OCTOBER 1st. HALDIMAND BACON HOG FAIR

Haldimand Bacon Hog Fair held in co-operation with Caledonia Agricultural Society, Fair Grounds, Caledonia on Friday, October 1st, 1948. Under the auspices of the Haldimand Yorkshire Swine Breeders' Club and the Caledonia Agricultural Society and open to exhibitors of Haldimand County and the adjoining Townships of Onondaga, Ancaster, Glanford and Binbrook.

#### RULES

1. All animals shown must be the property of the exhibitor and bacon hogs in market classes must have been fed by the owner for a period of not less than 90 days preceding exhibition.
2. All sows and boars exhibited must be pure bred and must be registered with exception of those entered in sections 4 and 13 and in which case they must be pure bred and tattooed. Pedigrees must be available should Directors ask for them.
3. No animal may be shown in more than one class except championship classes.
4. Market hogs may be pure bred, grade or cross bred.
5. Not more than two entries shall be allowed in any one class by each exhibitor.
6. If required, exhibitors must make statutory declarations that the animals are of the ages stated by them.
7. Sows exhibited in classes 8, 9, and 10 must show well recognized evidence of being in pig or must have recently had a litter.
8. All swine must be on the grounds, unloaded and exhibited in pens by 10.00 a.m. on Friday, October 1st; judging to commence at 1.00 o'clock.
9. All market hogs must be sold by sealed tender to the highest bidder on the basis of dressed carcass grade & carcass weight. Bid must be in the hands of the Secretary by 2.00 p.m., Friday, October 1st and must show the price per hundred-weight to the farmer on the A grade and the differentials between grades; purchaser to take delivery of hogs at fair grounds at 5.00 p.m., Friday, October 1st.
10. All market hogs will be identified in a distinct manner by tattoo so that each lot can be readily distinguished from any other lot.
11. Official grading certificates and statements of placing will be mailed to each exhibitor of market hogs immediately judging is completed after slaughter.
12. Judging will be done by members of the hog grading staff of the Live Stock Production Services.
13. Hogs entered in the market classes should weigh not less than 190 lbs. or more than 220 lbs. and produce carcasses weighing from 140 - 170 lbs.
14. Ages of all swine shall be computed from March 1st and September 1st.

### COMMERCIAL PRODUCTION FEATURE

#### POULTRY AND EGGS

CALEDONIA FALL FAIR, OCTOBER 1st and 2nd, 1948

In co-operation with the Ontario Department of Agriculture, the Poultry Services of the Dominion Department of Agriculture, the Haldimand Farmers' Co-operative Association and the Haldimand Junior Farmers' Association a new series of classes will be inaugurated this year reflecting one of the major sources of farm revenue in the Caledonia Society area.

This year it has been decided to stress the importance of poultry and eggs. The "Feature" will include competitive classes, an attractive display and educational demonstrations.

It is hoped that in this way the Society by its Fall Fair can do much to encourage the improvement of commercial production of poultry products in this area.

Competitive classes in dressed poultry and eggs are being provided and handsome prizes are being offered. Educational demonstrations are being arranged by teams of Junior Farmers and will be given at specified hours during Friday and Saturday afternoons, October 1st and 2nd.

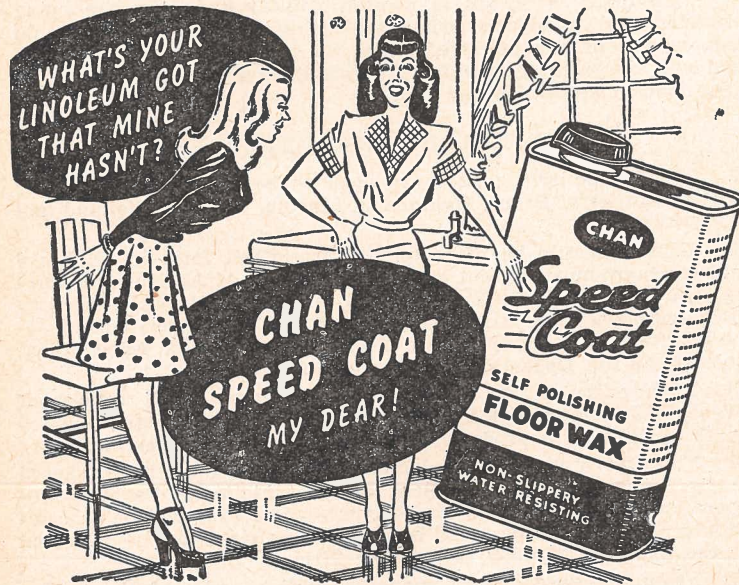
#### RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. The competitive classes are open to bonafide farmers living in the counties of Brant, Haldimand, Lincoln, Norfolk, Welland and Wentworth.
2. Entries should be made on the prescribed form in triplicate and one copy must be sent to the Department of Agriculture, Cayuga, on or before September 1st, 1948, in the case of market poultry and September 15th in the case of eggs. Entry forms can be secured from Reg. M. Hudspeth, Secretary, Caledonia Agricultural Society, or the Department of Agriculture, Cayuga.
3. Each entry in the dressed poultry classes shall consist of twenty (20) birds which shall have been carefully selected and fed by the exhibitor to produce the highest possible quality bird.
4. The twenty birds thus selected and entered must be marketed at the Poultry Processing Plant of the Haldimand Farmers Co-operative Association located at Cayuga where they will be processed and packed in Commercial boxes. The entries must be delivered to the plant on Monday, September 27th.
5. From the twenty birds marketed will be selected the twelve (12) which will be box packed to make the final exhibit.
6. One copy of the entry form must be forwarded with the birds at the time of delivery to the plant for processing to assist in identifying the entry.
7. There is no limit to the number of entries that may be received from any one county but not more than one entry will be accepted from any one farm.

13. The Committee in charge shall have power to make such other rules and regulations as are deemed advisable.
14. The Committee shall have power to reallocate the prize money offered if it is deemed necessary and advisable.
