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Rules and Regulations

1. That competition for the following prizes be open to the world, except when otherwise specified in the Prize List.
2. That annual membership fee if paid on or before Thursday, Sept. 29th, 1938, will be \$1.00; after that date \$1.50 will be charged. Each Exhibitor must purchase a Member's Ticket before making entries, a registered firm being recognized as one exhibitor. If Member's Fees are not enclosed entries will be refused.
3. That grain, seeds, roots, vegetables, horticultural products, plants, flowers, dairy products, agricultural implements, domestic manufactures, ladies' work and fine arts must be on the ground and put in order at 10 a.m. on the first day of the Fair—Thursday, Sept. 29th—and to remain until 4.30 p.m. on the third day.
4. Poultry must be on the grounds and put in order before 10 a.m. on the second day of the Fair, and remain until close of the exhibition on Saturday, October 1st, at 4.30 p.m.
5. Admission Fees—No charge on Thursday during the day, but a charge of 25c will be made to Arena Thursday evening, 6 p.m. to 10 p.m., but note that the ticket purchased for Thursday evening will admit to Fair on Friday. Admission Friday, Sept. 30th, 25c. Friday evening from 6 to 10 p.m. admission will be 35c and ticket will be good for Saturday, October 1st. Children under 14 years free on Friday and 15c on Saturday. Motor cars 25c each day. Passengers 25c on Friday, 35c on Saturday.
6. All articles of manufacture including ladies' work, must be modern and all collections of fancy work must be properly mounted.
7. Not less than one bushel of each kind of grain must be shown unless otherwise specified in the Prize List, and the grain and roots must be the growth of 1938 and grown by the competitor; except clover seed which may be the growth of 1937.
8. All produce to be the growth of parties exhibiting same.
9. No member will be allowed to make more than one entry in each case for Society Prizes with the same animal or article unless otherwise specified. This rule not to apply to animals in herds or pens, nor to special prizes offered by persons outside the Society, but to apply to all kinds of grains, seeds, flour, roots and vegetables, dairy products, domestic manufactures and horticultural products, in which additional specimens would necessarily be similar to the first.
10. None but manufacturers or their agents must exhibit agricultural machinery.
11. No entries to be removed from the Hall or Root and Vegetable Hall until 4.30 p.m. on the third day of the fair.
12. Every Animal, fowl, article, product or chattel exhibited must be the actual bona fide property and belong absolutely to the person or persons entering or exhibiting the same. In the case of every article, product or chattel exhibited, other than live stock, the said article, product or chattel must be of the actual production, growth or manufacture, as the case may be, of the person or persons owning or exhibiting the same, except specially mentioned in the list.
13. Every exhibitor of grain (clover seed excepted) is required to present an affidavit that his exhibit has been produced in 1938.
14. That no person be allowed to ride or drive horses on the grounds faster than a walk, except when shown or ordered to do

so by the Judges, under penalty of immediate removal from the grounds.

15. The exhibitor's name must not be on the bag, etc., in which his produce is exhibited.

16. That no person be allowed to attach any prize or badge obtained at other fairs on any animal or article exhibited until after the judges have made their awards.

17. That all articles entered for competition must be entered in strict accordance with the Prize List in order to secure a prize, the exact number and quantity stated in the Prize List being strictly adhered to.

18. That every bull must have a ring in his nose; horses, colts, cows and calves to be led on the grounds and be secured by the head and pigs and sheep confined in pens, and that owners shall comply with such minor regulations for their safe custody and fair and complete exhibition, as the Committee of Management may suggest.

19. That the exhibitors of horses, cattle and sheep do bring them forward when called upon by the Directors, otherwise they will not be noticed.

20. No competitor will be entitled to a premium if the judges deem the stock or article unworthy of the same.

21. Any person interfering by conversation or otherwise, with the Judges until after judgment is passed, shall have no prize awarded him.

22. Judges will please sign and hand in their list of awards to the Secretary, and remain until their books have been signed by the Secretary, in order that cases of error or doubt may be more promptly and easily made right, and they are particularly requested not to leave the grounds until they have ascertained from the Secretary that there are no protests against the awards in their department.

23. Any exhibitor or interested person making a protest will be required to make a deposit of \$2, and if said protest is not sustained the said amount will be retained by the Association.

24. All protests to be made in writing as soon as possible, so that the judges in the class may be heard on it, as the Directors of the Society do not constitute a Board of Judges to hear complaints. The Directors earnestly hope that the exhibitors will not enter protests without strong grounds for doing so, as much annoyance and unpleasantness is often occasioned by protests of a frivolous nature.

25. The Society will not be responsible for any loss, damage or accident occurring to any person or property on the grounds during the Fair. The Directors hope patrons of the Fair will obey orders. The Society will take all reasonable care of exhibits, but will not be responsible for any loss or damage.

26. Notice is hereby given that any kind of gambling, theatricals, circus or mountebank performances, exhibitions or shows; also huckstering or trafficking of spirituous or intoxicating drinks are not allowed within 300 yards of the exhibition grounds, and that 31 Vic., Cap. 29, Clauses 56, 57 and 58, relating thereto, will be enforced if any deviations from the regulations occur.

27. Whilst every possible assistance will be most cheerfully given in placing exhibits, no package or case of any kind whatsoever will be opened unless accompanied by the exhibitor or some one sent specially in charge.

28. Tickets will be placed on the work that has been exhibited before, or is entered in the wrong list, with the words "Ruled Out."

29. Ages of Beef Cattle will be calculated from September 1; Dairy Cattle, August 1.

30. Ages of Swine will be calculated from Sept. 1.

31. Should rain or some other cause materially cut the gate receipts, Caledonia Agricultural Society reserve the right to pay prize money only to the extent of their cash resources.

ENTRIES

32. All entries to be made by mail or otherwise before 8 p.m. on Tuesday, Sept. 27th, 1938, to the Secretary at Caledonia. Parties making entries after that date must pay an additional fee of 50 cents.

33. Exhibitors will find their Entry Cards and Member's Ticket ready for them at the Secretary's Office on the first day of the Fair, or will be sent by mail if asked to do so.

PREMIUMS

34. Exhibitors winning Special Prizes will call at 5 p.m. on Saturday, the third day of the Fair, for Special Prize orders. The Treasurer will commence to pay prize money October 27. Checks will be mailed to prize winners for the amount standing to their credit on the Secretary's books.

35. Where the amount of prizes won by the exhibitor is \$5 or over, \$1.00 will be retained for Membership Fee for 1939.

36. In the Sheep and Cattle Classes where there is no competition, only 1st prize will be paid.

JUDGES, ETC.

37. Judges for each day will be at the Secretary's Office on the grounds at 12 a.m.

38. Judging will commence at 12 o'clock noon, Sept. 29th, and 1 p.m. on Sept. 30th, and 12.30 on October 1st.

39. The members of the different committees will be on the grounds at 9 a.m. each day.

SPECIAL NOTES

The Hall will be closed at 4.30 p.m. on Saturday, and everyone must leave the hall. Tickets will be supplied by the Secretary to all exhibitors for admission, when they can take down their goods in quietness. Tickets for admission to Hall will be found with Entry Tickets, or can be had from the Secretary.

Cattle must not be removed from the cattle barns before 4 p.m. on Saturday, Oct. 1st. Any exhibitor who does so shall forfeit his prize money.

In case an error occurs in the printing of the Prize List, the Directors have the power to rectify the same.

REGULATIONS RE TRIALS OF SPEED

1. Each event will have three heats and each heat will be a race.

2. Not more than a 50% payment on prizes awarded for trials of speed shall be made, before all prize winners in Agricultural Classes shall have received at least a 50% payment on prize accounts.

3. Should it be found impossible to pay prize money in full, winners in "Trials of Speed Classes" shall not be given preference over winners in other Agricultural Classes in the percentage of prize money paid.

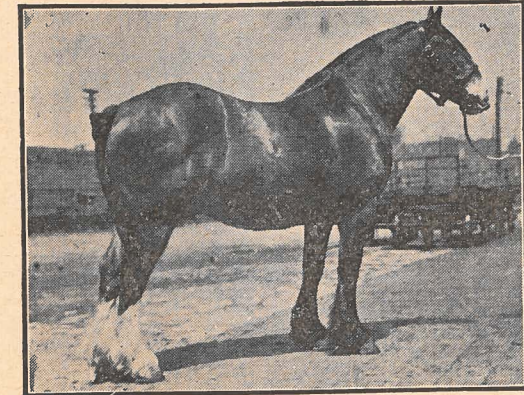

1. Heavy Horses to be shown on **Friday, the Second day of Fair at 12.30 p.m.**, and must be on the grounds at 12 o'clock noon.

2. Light Horses and Hunters to be shown on **Saturday, the third day of Fair, at 12.30 p.m.**, and must be on the grounds by 12 o'clock noon.

3. Exhibitors must bring their horses promptly when called.

4. Draught Horses to be shown before wagons in farm harness. General Purpose Horses before democrats. Road Horses before ordinary buggies and Colts to halter. Three-year-old Colts may be shown in harness as teams. All Harness Horses will be shown in front of grand stand.

5. Mares and Colts may compete for progeny prizes and not necessarily belong to exhibitor.

6. In competing for Championships, horses and colts must have already taken first or second prize in their respective classes.

7. Rule No. 9 in Prize List not to apply to horses.

Entry Fee—10% Deducted From Prize Winners.

FOAL CLUB SECTION

Caledonia Foal Club

Sponsored by the Caledonia Agricultural Society, the Ontario Department of Agriculture and the Dominion Department of Agriculture.

Regulations

1. All general rules of the 1938 Ontario Boys' Foal Club Policy will apply.
2. Competition open to Foal Club members only.
3. Members shall be boys living on farms between the ages of 14 and 20, whose entry has been received July 1st, 1938.
4. All foals must have been born since January 1, 1938, and must be sired by a registered stallion of a heavy draft breed.
5. Competitor must, so far as possible, have fed, cared for and fitted his foal for at least two months previous to the date of exhibition.
6. Club member must take exclusive charge of his animal during the show and shall exhibit it in the ring when judged or paraded and no outside assistance in preparing the animal for the show ring will be permitted. This is a Boy's Show and parents, guardians or others interested must leave this work to the exhibitor. This rule will be strictly enforced.
7. Judges' decision to be final.
8. Foals to be on grounds by 11 a.m. and shall not be taken home until after 5 p.m., on Friday, Sept. 30th, 1938.
9. No prize money will be paid unless colts appear in the Junior Live Stock Parade in the afternoon.
10. One or more of the winning foals may be selected by the Foal Club and exhibited at the Royal Winter Fair, Toronto.
11. Prize money will be awarded on the following basis:
 - 300 points for award on foal, which will be judged on its conformation.
 - 200 points for judging competition and answers to questions.
 - 100 points for showmanship.
 - 100 points for attendance and interest shown at meetings and judging classes.

700 points.

PRIZES—1st \$8, 2nd \$6, 3rd \$5, 4th \$5, 5th \$4, 6th \$4, 7th \$4, 8th \$4, 9th \$4, 10th \$3, 11th \$3, 12th \$3.

Prize money provided equally by the Caledonia Agricultural Society, the Ontario Department of Agriculture and the Dominion Department of Agriculture.

CALF CLUB SECTION**Regulations**

1. All general rules of the 1938 Ontario Boys' Calf Club Policy will apply.
2. Competition open to Calf Club members only.
3. Animals to be on the Fair Grounds not later than 9.00 a.m. standard time, on Friday, Sept. 30th, 1938.
4. Judging Competition will commence at 9.30 a.m. sharp; exhibition and showmanship classes at 2.30 in the afternoon.
5. Training, fitting and exhibiting of animals to be done by the boys owning the calves.

6. Judges' decision to be final.
7. All calves to remain on Fair Grounds until 5.00 p.m.
8. No prize money will be paid unless calves take part in live stock parade in front of Grand Stand.
9. Prize money will be paid at the annual Junior Banquet in November.

Basis of Award

Exhibition of Calves—Each calf will be scored by the Judges on a basis of 400 points. Ribbons will be awarded as prizes in this section.

Showmanship Class—The manner in which the animal is fitted and shown, the halter and all other details will be taken into consideration. 100 points will be allowed for showmanship.

Judging Competition and Answers to Questions—Each competitor will be required to judge a class composed of four animals, give reasons for his placing and answer ten questions based on club work and feeding and management of cattle.

Prizes—Prize money will be awarded on the following basis: 400 points for award on calf.

300 points for judging competition, answers to questions and showmanship.

(a) 100 points for judging competition.

(b) 100 points for answers to ten questions.

(c) 100 points for showmanship.

300 points for Junior Stockmen's Award.

(a) 100 points for care and feeding methods.

(b) 100 points for regularity and accuracy in forwarding monthly reports.

(c) 100 points for attendance and interest shown at meeting and judging classes.

1000 points.

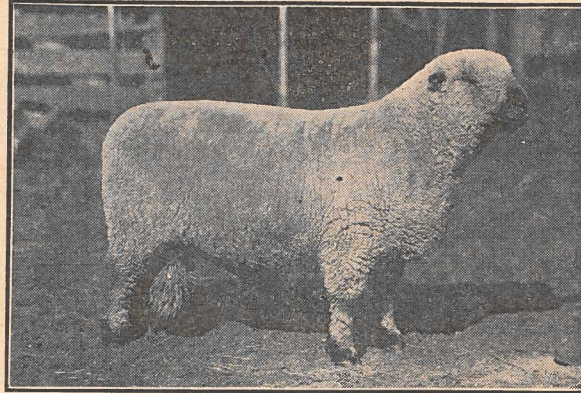

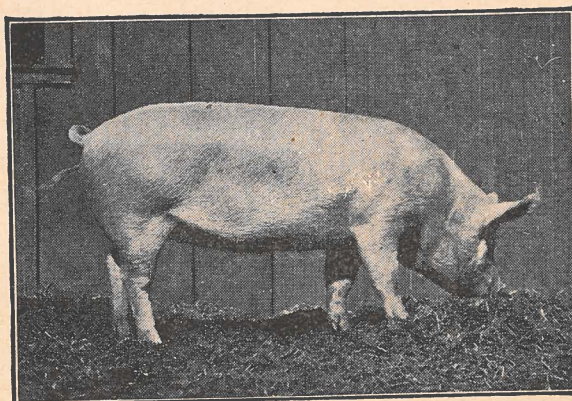
