## Rules and Regulations

1. That all competition for the following prizes be open to the world except as otherwise specified in prize list.

2. All exhibitors must be bona fide owners of animals, or producers of articles exhibited. Sec. 25 of Act.—The Board of Directors of any association or society organized under this act on being made aware of any fraud having been committed by any member or exhibitor in the entry of any stock or goods in competition for prizes at any exhibition shall have the power of withholding the payment of any prize which may have been awarded by the Judges to such members or exhibitors on such fraudulent of any other entries made at any such exhibition. R.S.O., 1887, c. 29, s. 78.

3. Farm Produce, Roots, Vegetables, etc., to be the growth of the party exhibiting and of the year 1907.

4. That no person shall be a judge and no Director superintend judging on any article in any class in which they are competitors, and in case any prizes are awarded the same shall be forfeited, and that no exhibitor shall be allowed to interfere with the Judges while in discharge of their respective duties under forfeiture of all prizes awarded to them.

5. That all articles and animals intended for competition must be entered in strict accordance with the rules and regulations.

6. That Grain, Seeds, Roots and Vegetables, Horticultural Products, Plants and Flowers, Dairy Products, Miscellaneous Manufactures, Ladies' Useful and Fancy Work, etc., shall be on the grounds at 10 a.m. on Tuesday, the 24th day of September, the first day of the exhibition, unless otherwise provided; and all other Horses, Cattle, Sheep, Poultry, Pigs, Implements, etc., are required to be on the grounds by 10 a.m. on the second day, Wednesday, the 25th of September.

7. That Horses and Cattle be secured by the head on the grounds, and Pigs and Sheep confined in pens or no prize will be awarded, and that exhibitors shall comply with such minor regulations for their safe keeping and fair and complete exhibition as the Committee of Management may suggest.

8. First premiums will be designated by a red card, the second by a blue and the third by a green card.

9. That persons exhibiting thoroughbred stock must produce their certificates of registration under the new standard.

10. Agricultural Implements and Miscellaneous Manufactures to be exhibited by the manufacturer or agent. Any persons making entries as agents for more than one producer or manufacturer must pay the regular subscription for each of such parties, and if any person shall enter an article for exhibition as produced or manufactured by himself, when it has not really been so, he shall not receive the prize awarded. In Ladies' Useful and Fancy Work, etc., all articles which have so often been prize takers will at this exhibition be precluded from prizes.

11. That no person shall be allowed to enter for exhibition more than one specimen in any section of a class. This rule not to apply to animals, but to all other exhibits in which each additional specimen would necessarily be precisely similar to the first. Only one specimen can be shown from any one plot of land in natural products.

12. No animal to be shown in more than one class, except for special prizes.

13. That exhibitors of all animals must be in attendance and ready for the judges when called upon, and to be owner one month before the fair. One herdsman's ticket will be issued when necessary.

14. That no person or persons will be allowed to attach any badge or prize ticket (simply the entry ticket) on any animal or article exhibited until the Judges have made their award.

15. No animal or article shall be moved from the grounds until after 4.30 p.m. on the 25th of September, the second day of exhibition.

16. That no name, mark, etc., shall appear on any of the articles exhibited, or on the bag, box, etc., in which they are exhibited, whereby the owner may be known to the Judges.

17. In the absence of competition in any section, or if the stock or article, etc., exhibited be of inferior quality, the Judges are instructed to award only such premiums as in their discretion the exhibits deserves, if first, second, third or none.

18. Draught Horses, not entire, to be shown in lumber wagons and farm harness.

19. General Purpose Horses, not entire, to be shown in democrat wagons and farm harness.

20. Any person not having his name subscribed as a member with any of the Directors of the society by Friday, the 29th of September, 1907, can send his membership fee to the Secretary with list of entries, who will receive them up to seven o'clock on that day—any day earlier will be more satisfactory.

21. The Society, while gratefully acknowledging the receipt of special prizes from the various donors, do not hold themselves responsible to the public in respect thereof.

22. Any exhibitor lodging a protest must make it in writing to the Secretary during the fair, and deposit one dollar, which will be forfeited to the Society if protest is not sustained.

## Entries

Exhibitors must make their entries on or before Friday, the 20th day of September, at 7 o'clock p.m., at the Secretary's residence, corner Tuscorora and Munsie Streets, Cayuga, and must produce their certificates of membership, or enclose one dollar. No entries will be made unless accompanied by certificate or one dollar.

Entry blank are at the back of the Prize List. Exhibitors will please be careful to state the class, section, etc., in which they intend each article or animal to compete, and sign their names.

The Secretary will be found at his office on the grounds on Tuesday, September 24th, at 9 a.m., when all entry tickets will be ready for delivery when exhibitor arrives.

## Membership

Each member of the Society will receive one membership ticket entitling him to enter the grounds three times during the Fair, and one gate ticket.

Exhibitors will please obtain their membership tickets from any of the Directors or other officers of the Society and forward with their list of entries to the Secretary.

## Premiums

The Treasurer, M. McClung, Esq., will pay cheques for premiums at his residence, Cayuga, on and after the 15th day of October, 1907. All premiums not applied for by 1st of December will be forfeited.

## Judges

Judges on Grain, Seeds, Roots, Vegetables, Horticultural Products, Plants, Flowers, Dairy Products, Miscellaneous Manufactures, Ladies' Fancy Work, Fine Arts, etc., will kindly report themselves at the Secretary's office on the grounds not later than 11 o'clock a.m. on Tuesday, the 24th of September, 1907, the first day of the Exhibition, when judging will commence.

Judges on Track and Carriage Horses, Horses, Brood Mares and Foals, Cattle, Sheep, Poultry, Pigs, Implements, etc., will please report themselves on Wednesday morning, the 25th of September, 1907, at ten o'clock, sharp, the second day.

Members of the different committees will be kind enough to attend at nine o'clock a.m. each day, and take charge of their respective departments.

Expert Judges on all Live Stock will be ready to judge at 11 o'clock a.m. on second day.
