RULES & REGULATIONS.

1. The Show open to the world.
2. No competitor will be entitled to a premium if the judges deem the stock or article unworthy of the same.
3. All persons wishing to become members for the present season can do so by paying \$1.00 before the 5th of October.
4. Not less than one bushel of each kind of grain must be shown, unless otherwise specified in the prize list, and the grain and roots must be the growth of 1897, and grown by the competitor, except clover seed, which may be the growth of 1896.
5. All produce to be the growth of parties exhibiting the same.
6. No member allowed to make more than one entry in each class for Society's prizes with the same animal or article. This rule not to apply to animals as in Herds and Pens, nor to special prizes offered by persons outside the Society, nor to the Society's Special Horse Class, but to apply to all kinds of grain, seeds, flour, roots and vegetables, dairy products, domestic manufactures and horticultural products, in which additional specimens would necessarily be similar to the first.
7. None but manufacturers or their agents must exhibit agricultural implements.
8. Any person interfering, by conversation or otherwise, with the judges until after judgment is passed, shall have no prize awarded him.
9. All the exhibitors must be the bona fide owners of animals exhibited, except in the Special Horse Class.
10. The exhibitor's name not to be on the bag, etc., in which his produce is exhibited.
11. No article to be removed from the Drill Hall until after four p.m. on the second day of the Show.
12. Admission to the grounds 25c., children under twelve 10c.
13. Each member will be supplied with two admission tickets and an exhibitor's ticket. Herdsmen's tickets will be given at the gate by the gate-tender.
14. All buggy horses not intended for exhibition, driving on the grounds, will be charged 25c., team 50c., and each person in vehicle 25c.
15. Farm produce, implements, manufactures, fine arts and ladies' work to be on the ground at 10 o'clock a.m. on first day of the Show.
16. Live stock will be required to be on the grounds by 10 a.m. on the second day of the Show, and all animals exhibited to remain until 4 p.m. of the same day.
17. All articles of manufacture, including ladies' work, shall have been manufactured by the exhibitor during the present year.
18. Any member entering horses, stock, etc., of other parties who are not members of the Society, for Society's prizes, shall forfeit all claims to any prizes that may be awarded.
19. The Directors will take every possible precaution to insure the articles sent to the Exhibition, and should any article be accidentally injured, lost, or stolen, they will give all the assistance in their power to the recovery of the same, but will not make any payment for the recovery thereof.
20. The Society will not issue checks for payment of prizes until Friday, October 15th.
21. Numbers of horses having heretofore been entered merely for the purpose of driving about the grounds, the committee on horses will have the power to exclude from the grounds any such animals as appear unworthy of entering for competition.

22. That no person be allowed to ride or drive horses on the grounds faster than a walk, except when shown and ordered so to do by the judges, under a penalty of immediate removal from the grounds.

23. That no person or persons be allowed to attach any prize ticket or badge obtained at other fairs on any animal or article exhibited until after the judges have made their award.

24. That all articles entered for competition must be entered in strict accordance with the prize list in order to secure a prize, the exact number or quality stated in prize list being strictly adhered to.

25. That every bull must have a ring in its nose, and pigs and sheep be confined in pens.

26. That the exhibitors of horses, cattle and sheep do bring them forward when called upon by the judges, otherwise they will not be noticed by the judges.

27. The grain, seeds, flour, roots and vegetables, horticultural and dairy products, domestic and miscellaneous manufactures, musical instruments, miscellaneous exhibits, fine arts, fancy work, plants and flowers, must be on the grounds and put in order before 10 o'clock on the first day of the Fair; horses, cattle, sheep, pigs, poultry, carriages, etc., must be on the grounds and put in order before 10 o'clock on the second day of the Fair; and remain until the close of the Exhibition, Friday, October 8th, at 4 o'clock p.m.

28. Judges will please sign and hand in their list of awards to the Secretary, and remain together until their book has been signed by the Secretary, in order that cases of error or doubt may be more promptly and easily made right, and are particularly requested not to leave the grounds until they have ascertained from the Secretary that there are no protests against the awards in the classes they have judged.

29. All protests to be made in writing as soon as possible, so that the judges in the class can be heard on it, as the directors of the Society do not constitute a board of judges to hear complaints and receive appeals. The Directors earnestly hope that exhibitors will not enter protests without strong grounds for doing so, as much annoyance and unpleasantness is often occasioned by protests of a frivolous nature.

30. No person shall be permitted on the judges' stand during the Exhibition, except the judges, directors and reporters.

31. While the directors will use every care possible, they beg to notify the public that they will not be responsible for accidents, such as runaway horses, etc., or for any damage done by them.

32. The Directors will not be responsible for any accident either to man or beast that may occur in crossing or re-crossing the track while horses are shown for prize "drivers." Men will be in charge of the track to prevent people from crossing, and the Directors hope patrons of the Fair will obey orders.

33. Judges for first day will meet at the Secretary's office at 11 a.m. Judge for second day will meet at the Secretary's office at 11 a.m. Secretary's office on the grounds.

NOTE.

All entries to be made by mail or otherwise before 8 p.m. on Tuesday, the 5th of October, to the Secretary at Caledonia. Parties making entries after that date must pay an additional fee of fifty cents. No entry tickets will be given after the judges have received their books.
